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Welcome Remarks

The Chairman said a quorum was present and the second meeting of the Community Involvement, Culture and Recreation Committee (CICRC) in 2025 commenced officially. He welcomed all Members and departmental representatives to the meeting, in particular those who attended the CICRC meeting for the first time:

- Ms Candy WO, Head of Primary Health Services; and Ms Sindy CHOW, Advanced Practitioner (Nurse); of the Haven of Hope Christian Service (HOHCS);
- Miss Nancy CHAN, Chief Officer (Youth and Community Service), the Hong Kong Young Women's Christian Association (HKYWCA); and Mr Simon CHAN, Unit-in-charge (Administration), Tseung Kwan O Integrated Social Service Centre of HKYWCA; and

I. Confirmation of Minutes of the 1st CICRC Meeting in 2025 held on 21 January 2025

2. The Chairman said the Secretariat had not received any proposed amendment before the meeting. As there was no proposed amendment at the meeting either, the Chairman declared that the above minutes were confirmed.

II. Report Items

(A) Introduction of Jockey Club DATAZONE Primary Healthcare Project

3. Prof Sophia CHAN, Prof Derek CHEUNG and Mr Solomon WONG of HKU, and Ms Candy WO of HOHCS introduced the project with the presentation slides.

4. Members' views and enquiries were summarised as follows:

- Members could assist in promoting the project and conducting home visits. They would welcome co-operation between the project and local organisations such as the Sai Kung and Tseung Kwan O Women's Association as well as property management companies in the district. They suggested promoting to residents the importance of timely health assessments through training volunteers and setting up relevant devices.
- They enquired about the sampling method for the women's health and weight management programme, and the use of the study data.
- They enquired about the details of the men's health programme, and the feasibility of providing outreach services.
- The Sai Kung District School Heads Association would promote the project to parents at schools in the district, with a view to encouraging more participation.

5. Prof Derek CHEUNG, School of Nursing of HKUMed, and Ms Candy WO, Head of Primary Health Services of HOHCS said the women's health programme primarily targeted women aged 45 to 64. Persons interested in participating in the women's health and weight management programme could register at the Haven of Hope Po Lam Community Health Development Centre located at shop G04, G/F, MCP One.

6. Prof Sophia CHAN, Senior Advisor, President's Office, HKU gave consolidated responses as follows:

- The study data would be owned by the Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust. The study team would compile a report after completion of the project, and would share the relevant data at regular academic conferences. The data would also be shared with the Health Bureau, the Labour and Welfare Bureau, and the Home and Youth Affairs Bureau.
- The study would invite both men and women to participate, and men often had obesity issues. The weight management programme would help participants review and control their weight based on their Body Mass Index (BMI).
- In addition to the above project, HKU Primary Health Care Academy (PHCA) had also rolled out various programmes, including “Generations Connect” and “Quit for Kids”. These programmes provided relevant training for students to visit elderly persons and assisted smoking families to quit smoking respectively. If Members were interested in offering assistance, they could contact PHCA after the meeting to discuss co-operation details.

7. Ms Candy WO, Head of Primary Health Services of HOHCS said HOHCS would review and take into account the operation of relevant devices, so as to proactively consider the provision of outreach services.

(B) Introduction of Social Welfare Services/District Collaboration Projects in Sai Kung/Tseung Kwan O - Hong Kong Young Women's Christian Association Tseung Kwan O Integrated Social Service Centre

8. Miss Nancy CHAN of HKYWCA and Mr Simon CHAN of HKYWCA's Tseung Kwan O Integrated Social Service Centre introduced the project with the presentation slides.

9. Members' views and enquiries were summarised as follows:

- They suggested that HKYWCA should provide more support for young night drifters (YNDs) in the district, and arrange exchange sessions for Members to understand YNDs' needs.
- They suggested that HKYWCA should reach young people in the district via social media platforms currently popular among them, such as “Threads”.
- They suggested that HKYWCA should produce short videos featuring distinctive elements of Tseung Kwan O, or conduct street interviews to understand what young people currently liked. While releasing the videos, HKYWCA should also make effective use of the keyword searching function to boost the hit rate.
- They enquired about the details of the provision of film audio description services for persons with visual impairment.
- They appreciated HKYWCA's efforts to organise various activities catering

for community needs with inclusive elements to support underprivileged groups in the district.

- They suggested that HKYWCA should organise more environmental cleaning activities for young people.

10. Miss Nancy CHAN, Chief Officer (Youth and Community Service), HKYWCA gave consolidated responses as follows:

- Apart from supporting “midstream” young people, HKYWCA would also proactively facilitate its youth outreaching teams in the district to encourage YNDs to join the project. There were indeed YND participants every year. She expressed her gratitude for Members’ recent efforts to visit their YND service teams, as well as to exchange ideas with and offer encouragement to them.
- HKYWCA would actively consider using more social media platforms to reach young people and invite them to produce various types of short videos. For example, the themes of the videos could be introduction of the running tracks and walking paths in Tseung Kwan O, and street interviews to understand young people’s views on emotional issues and encourage them to seek assistance when needed.
- The provision of audio description services was a short-term event held in the past. In the event, young people took part in designing activities with innovative ideas to understand the difficulties faced by persons with visual impairment in the district when watching films. They also learned audio description techniques to provide services for the visually impaired. If relevant volunteer activities were to be held in the future, HKYWCA would invite young people and Members to participate. Furthermore, HKYWCA also hoped to foster creative thinking among young people, with a view to proposing different solutions to community issues.

13. Members said the Sai Kung Rural Committee and the Hang Hau Rural Committee would like to invite fellow Members to attend the Tin Hau Festival activity in Joss House Bay, Sai Kung on 20 April. Moreover, the “Warm Welcome to the National Games Sai Kung District Dragon Boat Race 2025” would take place at the Sai Kung Pier during Tuen Ng Festival on 31 May. Members were encouraged to actively participate.

- (E) Organisation of Recreation and Sports Programmes for 2025-26 by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department
(SKDC(CICRC) Paper No. 13/25)

14. Members noted the paper.

15. Ms Jenny LAI, Deputy District Leisure Manager (District Support) Sai Kung, Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) gave consolidated responses as follows:

- It would be the first time for Guangdong, Hong Kong and Macao to co-host the 15th National Games (NG), as well as the 12th National Games for Persons with Disabilities (NGD) and the 9th National Special Olympic Games (NSOG).
- The Hong Kong Special Administrative Region Government would organise delegations to proactively participate in the 15th NG, as well as the 12th NGD and the 9th NSOG. Among other events, delegations would be organised to take part in mass participation events for the first time. For the 15th NG, the delegations would participate in events including competition events and mass participation events.
- The mass participation events would uphold the ideal of “benefit ordinary people, make a healthy China (全運惠民，健康中國)”. Relevant national sports associations or organisations would adhere to the principles of fairness, openness and impartiality to conduct athlete selections or objective technical tests to assess the skill level of athletes, with a view to selecting eligible athletes to take part in the games.
- The athlete selections and technical tests would be open for public participation free of charge. Relevant national sports associations or organisations must announce their registration arrangements for public information one month before the registration deadline. Other relevant organisations would also step up efforts in the publicity work with the slogan “I Want to Join the National Games” and create an atmosphere of “National Games for all”.
- To tie in with the athlete selections for mass participation events, the Secretariat of LCSD had launched publicity work with the slogan “I Want to Join the National Games” in January 2025, with the aim of encouraging members of the public to actively participate in the athlete selections. Relevant national sports associations or organisations would also assist in disseminating information about athlete selections, and include the hyperlink of the dedicated page for the 15th NG, and the 12th NGD and the 9th NSOG on their websites.

16. Members said some tables designed for persons with disabilities were occupied by other users at the Tiu Keng Leng Public Library.

17. The Chairman asked LCSD to take note of the relevant situation.

III. Discussion Items Suggested by Members

- (A) Suggest setting up community kitchens at suitable locations in Tseung Kwan O and Sai Kung District
(SKDC(CICRC) Paper No. 16/25)
20. The Chairman said the discussion item was raised by Ms Christine FONG, Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Mr CHEUNG Chin-pang, Mr LI Tin-chi, Mr CHAU Ka-lok, Mr WAN Kai-ming, Mr Philip LI, Mr WANG Wen, Mr CHENG Yu-hei, Mr WONG Wang-to and Ms WU Suet-lin.
21. Members noted the written reply from SWD (SKDC(CICRC) Paper No. 19/25).
22. Members' views and enquiries were summarised as follows:
- They enquired about the eligibility for using the canteens of District Elderly Community Centres or the relevant meal services.
 - They suggested providing residents with communal cooking spaces by setting up community kitchens. They also recommended encouraging the participation of volunteers, such as retirees, to enhance their sense of belonging to the community. Community kitchens could be set up near markets to facilitate residents' use of unsold food or resources in order to reduce waste.
23. Mr Edison LEUNG, Assistant Social Work Officer 2, Wong Tai Sin/Sai Kung District Planning and Co-ordinating Team, SWD said that SWD would provide relevant supplementary information after the meeting.
24. The Chairman suggested asking SWD to follow up the matter.
25. The Chairman suggested deleting the above discussion item at the next meeting.

- (B) Suggest organising activities commemorating the 100th anniversary of the death of Dr SUN Yat-sen and the Canton-Hong Kong Strike, and the 80th anniversary of victory in War of Resistance in Sai Kung District to enhance the patriotic awareness of local residents
(SKDC(CICRC) Paper No. 17/25)

26. The Chairman said the discussion item was raised by Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Mr Philip LI, Mr WAN Kai-ming, Mr WANG Wen, Ms KI Lai-mei, Mr CHENG Yu-hei, Mr WONG Wang-to, Mr LI Tin-chi, Ms Christine FONG and Mr CHAU Ka-lok.

27. Members noted the written replies from the Education Bureau (EDB), LCSD and the Sai Kung District Office (SKDO) (SKDC(CICRC) Paper Nos. 20/25 to 22/25).

28. Members' views were summarised as follows:

- They suggested strengthening patriotic education and organising educational activities on major events affecting the history of modern China, such as the passing of Dr SUN Yat-sen and the victory in the War of Resistance.
- They suggested stepping up the promotion of red tourist spots in the district, such as the Memorial Monuments for Sai Kung Martyrs During World War II in Tsam Chuk Wan, and the Rosary Mission Centre at Wong Mo Ying Village. They also recommended providing additional relevant signage.
- They encouraged schools and local organisations in the district to organise different types of patriotic education activities.
- They suggested following up the maintenance situation of the aluminium facilities at the Memorial Monuments for Sai Kung Martyrs During World War II in Tsam Chuk Wan.

29. Miss LAM I-ching, Assistant District Officer (Sai Kung)1, SKDO said government departments, including SKDO, attached great importance to patriotic education and events of historical significance to our country, such as the 80th anniversary of victory in the War of Resistance. SKDO would continue strengthening liaison with the Sai Kung District School Heads Association, schools and various organisations in the district to promote patriotic education.

30. Miss Lacus CHENG, Assistant District Officer (Sai Kung)2, SKDO gave consolidated responses as follows:

- SKDO would mount a commemorative plaque on the pavilion next to Leung Shuen Wan Tin Hau Temple to commemorate the contribution of the Marine Detachment of the Hong Kong and Kowloon Independent Brigade of the East River Column. The plaque was expected to be completed in August this year. An unveiling ceremony for the commemorative plaque would be held and Members would be invited to join the ceremony.
- Regarding Members' suggestion to provide additional red tourism facilities, SKDO would have to take into account the availability of project resources

and other constraints, such as whether private land was involved. Therefore, SKDO was progressively studying and following up the suggestion.

- The Memorial Monuments for Sai Kung Martyrs During World War II in Tsam Chuk Wan were managed and maintained by the Sai Kung Rural Committee. SKDO would also assist in the basic maintenance and cleaning of the monuments from time to time. Regarding the damaged aluminium facilities at the monuments, the Works Section of SKDO would look into the situation and provide assistance.

31. Miss Olivia LAI, Senior Librarian (Sai Kung), LCSD said LCSD had been organising various activities on cultural and historical themes, including the pictorial exhibition on “Braving the Storm: Hong Kong in the War of Resistance”, and the “Roving Exhibition on the 75th Anniversary of the Founding of the People’s Republic of China” held last year. This year, LCSD would also organise a thematic talk cum roving exhibition “The War of Resistance in Hong Kong: Story of Sai Kung”, as well as book displays introducing historical figures such as Dr SUN Yat-sen.

32. Ms CHAN Fung-ping, Senior School Development Officer (Sai Kung)1, EDB said EDB attached great importance to the education on the history of the War of Resistance, patriotism and national security. She noted the above Members’ views.

33. The Chairman suggested asking EDB, LCSD and SKDO to follow up the matter.

34. The Chairman suggested deleting the above discussion item at the next meeting.

(C) Suggest launching the Putonghua Ambassadors Scheme in Sai Kung District (SKDC(CICRC) Paper No. 18/25)

35. The Chairman said the discussion item was raised by Ms KAN Tung-tung, Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Ms WU Suet-lin, Mr TSANG Kwok-ka, Mr CHENG Yu-hei, Mr Philip LI, Mr CHEUNG Man-tim, Mr WAN Kai-ming, Ms Christine FONG, Ms Angel CHONG, Mr CHONG Yuen-tung, Mr YAU Ho-lun and Mr WONG Wang-to.

36. Members noted the written reply from EDB (SKDC(CICRC) Paper No. 23/25).

37. Members suggested reviewing the current number of Putonghua lesson sessions and the teacher-student ratio. They also proposed enhancing the teaching content to increase students’ interest in learning Putonghua.

38. Ms CHAN Fung-ping, Senior School Development Officer (Sai Kung)1, EDB said EDB attached great importance to the cultivation of students’ Putonghua proficiency. For example, EDB has been supporting schools to create a rich Putonghua language environment. EDB provided a one-off grant to publicly-funded primary and secondary schools in the 2024/25 school year. Schools could use the grant to employ tutors or organise various Putonghua extra-curricular activities, in order to enhance students’ Putonghua proficiency.

39. The Chairman suggested asking EDB to follow up the matter.
40. The Chairman suggested deleting the above discussion item at the next meeting.
