Welcome Remarks

The Chairman said a quorum was present and the meeting commenced officially. He welcomed all Members and representatives of government departments and organisations to the fifth meeting of the Sai Kung District Council (SKDC) District Facilities and Works Committee (DFWC) in 2025, in particular Ms Vivian HO, Senior Project Manager (Technical Section) of the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD), Mr Andric LAM, Project Manager 1 (Project Team) of LCSD, Ms Koren SIN, Design Director of the Kirin Plus Lab Limited (Kirin Plus Lab) and Mr Kirin LEUNG, Managing Director of Kirin Plus Lab.

I. Confirmation of Minutes of the 4th DFWC Meeting in 2025 held on 15 July 2025

2. The Chairman stated that the Secretariat had not received any proposed amendment before the meeting. There being no proposed amendment at the meeting, the Chairman declared that the above minutes were confirmed.

II. Report Items

(A) Report on management of recreation and sports facilities in Sai Kung District from July to August 2025 by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 48/25)

3. Ms Koren SIN, Design Director, Kirin Plus Lab introduced the works project at Man Yee Playground under the “Transformation of Public Play Spaces” plan.

4. Members raised the following questions and views regarding the works project at Man Yee Playground:

- In terms of the ancillary facilities, they suggested:
 - Enlarging the trampoline.
 - Providing more swings, seating and arbours, and using opaque arbour covers.
- In terms of the safety of facilities, they suggested adding clear markings to:
 - Clearly indicate a safety zone around the swings.
 - Remind users of uneven ground surfaces.

- In terms of the overall planning and management of the playground, they suggested:
 - Installing fences at the entrance/exit to prevent cattle from going into the playground.
 - Regularly clearing branches and leaves from the drainage outlets in the playground so as to keep the drains clear.
 - Raising the playground floor to the same level as the adjacent footpath. They also enquired about the reasons for not including raising the playground floor in the current works.
- They enquired about the project cost and the construction timetable.

5. Mr Andric LAM, Project Manager 1 (Project Team), LCSD said that the project cost for Man Yee Playground would be funded by the provision under Subhead 3101GX of the Capital Works Reserve Fund. As the project was currently at the preliminary design stage, the exact cost was yet to be confirmed. The construction period for the project was expected to take place from the fourth quarter of 2026 to the fourth quarter of 2027.

6. Regarding the works at Man Yee Playground, Ms Koren SIN of Kirin Plus Lab responded as follows:

- In terms of the ancillary facilities:
 - Kirin Plus Lab would explore enlarging the trampoline as far as possible. However, the limited space of the venue had to be considered, and the safety distance of various play equipment must meet international playground safety standards.
 - The scope of works had already included the installation of one set of seating and an arbour. The arbour cover would be made of opaque materials to provide shade for users.
- In terms of the safety of facilities:
 - Kirin Plus Lab would explore using different patterns and colours on the ground surfaces, or using markings to indicate the safety zones of various play equipment at the playground.
 - Bright yellow tactile guide paths would be provided at the staircase of the entrance/exit of the playground, creating a sharp contrast with the adjacent footpath.
- In terms of the overall planning and management of the playground:
 - Kirin Plus Lab would explore with the relevant works department the feasibility of raising the playground floor to the same level as the adjacent footpath. However, since the cost involved might be relatively high, the current plan leaned towards focusing resources on enhancing the play equipment.
 - In addition to the existing fences, planter pots, seating and arbours at the entrance/exit of the playground, consideration would be given to placing more planters to prevent cattle from going into the playground.

7. Members continued to raise the following questions and views regarding the works project at Man Yee Playground:

- In terms of the ancillary facilities, they suggested:
 - Using more durable safety matting, and providing queue markings in both Chinese and English, as well as tactile guide paths for visually impaired persons.
 - Adding night-time lighting effects (for example, by installing ambient lights or spotlighting the octopus play tower).
- In terms of the safety of facilities, they suggested:
 - Adding clear signs on the trampoline to remind that children must be accompanied by an adult when using it.
 - Ensuring that children's fingers would not be stuck in the gaps of the octopus play tower.
- In terms of the overall planning of the playground:
 - They enquired whether the entire playground area could be extended if the playground floor was raised to the same level as the adjacent footpath.
- The expected construction period for the project was one year. They enquired whether underground utilities were involved.

8. Regarding the works at Man Yee Playground, Mr Andric LAM of LCSD responded as follows:

- LCSD would explore with the works department the feasibility of raising the playground floor to the same level as the adjacent footpath. It involved a number of considerations (such as the distribution of underground utilities/facilities, and the effect of additional loading from floor levelling materials on the underground facilities).
- The entire project would require time for completion, as it involved multiple stages (including preliminary feasibility study, hire of design teams for the tender exercise and tender evaluation procedures, detailed design, etc.) to ensure that the project could fully implement the design concept and could be completed smoothly.

9. Regarding the works project at Man Yee Playground, Ms Koren SIN of Kirin Plus Lab responded as follows:

- In terms of the ancillary facilities:
 - For the safety matting, a seamless floor matting design would be adopted. Hence, there would be less uneven surfaces found, unlikely tile mats. Kirin Plus Lab would also explore including queue markings.
 - The tactile guide paths in the playground would be retained for use by visually impaired persons in the works project.

- Kirin Plus Lab would explore adding night-time lighting effects (for example, spotlighting the octopus play tower) with the relevant works department.
- In terms of the safety of facilities:
 - All play equipment in the playground would be provided with safety markings.
 - Kirin Plus Lab would ensure that the gaps in the octopus play tower met international playground safety standards.
- Efforts would be made to shorten the playground closure time as far as possible during the construction period to minimise the impact on the public.

10. Members continued to raise the following questions and views regarding the works project at Man Yee Playground:

- In terms of the ancillary facilities:
 - They suggested that the cover for the arbour could feature an angle-adjusting function.
 - They enquired whether the selected safety matting had been used at other recreational venues, and if those mats were easy to clean.
- In terms of the safety of facilities:
 - They suggested increasing the area of the playground to provide adequate space for users of different ages.
 - They suggested that the slides should not be positioned facing the swings to prevent accidents.
- They suggested compressing the construction period as far as possible.

11. Regarding the works project at Man Yee Playground, Ms Koren SIN of Kirin Plus Lab responded as follows:

- In terms of the ancillary facilities:
 - The selected safety matting had been used in other projects under the “Transformation of Public Play Spaces” plan (such as Sham Shui Po Park and Quarry Bay Park).
 - The lower level of the octopus play tower could provide additional shading space. Part of the tube slides could also protect users from direct sunlight. However, under international playground safety standards, it was not recommended to install covers for the swings and the trampoline. Kirin Plus Lab would further explore ways to enhance the overall shading effect of the playground.
- In terms of the safety of facilities:
 - The octopus play tower would have multiple entrances/exits at varying heights. In addition, younger children might not be able to use the climbing net in the centre of the play tower to reach the higher levels. Hence, the design had already separated children of different ages to maintain a suitable safety distance.

- The trampoline would have an adequate and independent safety distance around it, which should not be shared by other play equipment.
- Kirin Plus Lab would explore adjusting the orientation of the slides and swings, taking into account factors such as the playground's actual space and the underground utilities/facilities.

12. The Chairman suggested that LCSD should continue to report to DFWC regarding the works progress of Man Yee Playground in a timely manner.

13. A Member suggested that a balance could be struck between the diversity and safety of the play equipment. They also proposed swapping the locations of the octopus play tower and the swings. Placing the octopus play tower in a more central location would enhance the playground's overall appeal, while reducing the likelihood of users colliding with each other. Additionally, they raised concerns about whether the trampoline, if not properly enclosed, might pose danger.

14. Ms Koren SIN of Kirin Plus Lab noted Members' views, and said that the trampoline was designed to be placed at ground level to allow easy access for wheelchair users. Raising the trampoline above ground level could bring inconvenience to those users. Kirin Plus Lab would continue to strive for a balance between the safety of the facilities and inclusiveness of the playground.

15. The Vice-Chairman enquired whether the playground was "pet-inclusive".

16. Ms Koren SIN of Kirin Plus Lab said that the target users of the playground were mainly children.

17. The Chairman asked LCSD to note Members' views on the works project at Man Yee Playground. He said that the representatives of Technical Section of LCSD and Kirin Plus Lab might leave the meeting first.

18. Members raised the following questions and views:

- Regarding the construction works at Tseung Kwan O South Park:
 - They suggested enhancing landscape maintenance to avoid temporary closures of certain areas of the park due to frequent repair works. They also suggested planting more trees to provide shade for visitors.
 - They proposed properly storing and regularly replacing the squeegees (commonly known as "water scrapers") beside the basketball courts to prevent them from wearing out and scratching the courts' rubber ground surfaces. If the squeegees were available for public use, they suggested providing illustrated instructions on their proper use.
 - They enquired about the progress of the installation works of safety padding on the walls near the children's basketball backstops.
 - They enquired about the opening date of the remaining facilities at Tseung Kwan O South Park.

- They expressed concerns about the presence of illegal structures at Clear Water Bay Second Beach, and enquired about the department’s follow-up actions.

19. Mr Jonathan HUNG, Senior Executive Officer (Planning)²², LCSD said the construction works for the remaining facilities at Tseung Kwan O South Park were expected to be completed by the end of 2025. LCSD was maintaining close liaison with the Architectural Services Department (ArchSD) and other works departments, with a view to opening the remaining facilities to the public as soon as possible.

20. Ms Susan LEE, District Leisure Manager (Sai Kung), LCSD responded as follows:

- Regarding the construction works at Tseung Kwan O South Park:
 - In addition to the park lawn which required maintenance, some newly planted Purple Tabebuia trees from its both sides had collapsed earlier during the typhoon. The areas involved had to be temporarily closed due to safety concerns.
 - Relevant works would be commenced later to install safety padding on the walls near the children’s basketball backstops to ensure users’ safety.
 - LCSD staff would be responsible for squeegeeing the basketball courts, and would pay more attention to the use of the squeegees.
 - Appropriate tree species had been planted in the park, and the trees would gradually grow and increase in size over time.
- LCSD would conduct joint operations with the Lands Department to deal with the issue of illegal structures at Clear Water Bay Second Beach.

21. The Chairman hoped that the remaining facilities at Tseung Kwan O South Park could be open to the public before the anniversary of the founding of the People’s Republic of China in 2025 (i.e. 1 October 2025). He further suggested inviting Members to conduct a site visit before the official opening of the remaining facilities, and providing the floor plans for the facilities for reference.

22. A Member continued to raise the following questions:

- They enquired about the design plan for the works project at Tai Po Tsai Rest Garden under the “Transformation of Public Play Spaces” plan.
- They enquired about the progress of the feasibility study on installing additional fans for the arbours at Sha Tsui Playground.

23. Ms Jenny LAI, Deputy District Leisure Manager (District Support) Sai Kung, LCSD said Tai Po Tsai Rest Garden had already been included in the “Transformation of Public Play Spaces” plan. A preliminary public consultation was underway (for example, by inviting parents and children to vote for their play equipment of choice). Members’ views would be relayed to the Technical Section of LCSD for follow-up after the meeting.

24. The Chairman asked LCSD to note Members' views.
25. Members noted the above report.
- (B) Report on community halls/ community centre/ activity centre in Sai Kung District (SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 49/25)
26. Members noted the above report.
- (C) Landslip Prevention and Mitigation Programme - Works progress in Sai Kung District (SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 50/25)
27. Members raised the following questions and views:
- They enquired whether slope stabilisation works would be conducted in the vicinity of Clear Water Bay Road (above Pik Sha Road).
 - They enquired whether more natural hillsides would be included in the Landslip Prevention and Mitigation Programme, and how this would be implemented (for example, whether locations showing clear landslip signs would be prioritised and installed with additional drainage channels).
 - They suggested prioritising the handling of locations close to residential areas or those with a higher risk of flooding (such as the areas around Wong Chuk Wan Village and Tso Wo Hang Village, where water had surged into houses due to inclement weather recently).
28. Miss Kiki YEUNG, Senior Engineer/20(East), East Development Office, Civil Engineering and Development Department (CEDD) said she would relay Members' views to the Geotechnical Engineering Office of CEDD for follow-up after the meeting.
29. Members noted the above report.

III. Discussion Items Suggested by Members

- (A) Look into the situation of recreational and sports facilities in the district, and suggest implementing the construction of the Sai Kung Sports Centre as soon as possible (SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 51/25)
30. The Chairman said that the discussion item was suggested by Ms Natasha YU, Mr LAM Chun-ka, Mr CHAN Chi-ho, Mr LI Tin-chi, Mr WANG Wen, Mr Chris CHEUNG, Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Mr CHAU Ka-lok, Ms TAM Chuk-kwan, Mr Philip LI, Mr CHAN Kwong-fai, Mr CHEUNG Chin-pang, Mr CHEUNG Man-tim, Mr WAN Kai-ming, Ms Christine FONG, Mr Kelvin YAU, Mr CHENG Yu-hei and Mr CHONG Yuen-tung.

31. Members noted the written reply from LCSD (SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 54/25).
32. Members raised the following questions and views:
- They suggested providing more parking spaces at the sports centre in the future to alleviate traffic congestion and the shortage of public parking spaces in the district.
 - According to the Hong Kong Planning Standards and Guidelines (HKPSG), the standard ratio recommended for recreational and sports facilities to the population of the district should be one indoor sports centre for every 50 000 to 65 000 persons. Sai Kung, with a population greater than 60 000, still lacked a sports centre. Therefore, they urged to expedite the provision of a sports centre in Sai Kung.
 - The current population of Sai Kung District had exceeded 500 000. With approximately 50 000 residential units to be completed in “Tseung Kwan O Area 137” in the future, the population of the district would grow further to about 700 000. They proposed relaxing the standard ratio for various recreational and sports facilities to the population of the district, in order to meet the increasing local demand.
 - They enquired about the long-term planning for the “Sports Centre-cum-Indoor Heated Swimming Pool and Riverine Park in Area 65, Tseung Kwan O”, and whether the planning work was currently underway.
33. Mr Jonathan HUNG of LCSD noted Members’ views and responded as follows:
- During the planning of the works projects, LCSD would continue to monitor the development of Sai Kung District, taking into account various factors for comprehensive consideration. LCSD would provide appropriate recreational and sports facilities for local residents in accordance with policy objectives and priorities, the utilisation of existing recreational and sports facilities, demographic changes in the district, demand for various facilities, HKPSG, as well as the views of SKDC and stakeholders.
 - Under the fiscal consolidation programme, the Government would review the priorities, necessity and importance of projects under planning, including how to make more effective use of public resources, and the cost-effectiveness of capital works expenditure. The implementation programmes of individual projects at the preliminary planning stage would be adjusted based on the above considerations. LCSD would continue to review the progress of various works projects in the district, including the implementation programmes for the “Sports Centre and Town Plaza at Sai Kung” and the “Sports Centre-cum-Indoor Heated Swimming Pool and Riverine Park in Area 65, Tseung Kwan O”, and would suitably update the works timetables to ensure more effective use of public resources.
 - Regarding the proposal to provide public parking spaces at the “Sports Centre and Town Plaza at Sai Kung”, LCSD would review various factors with the

Transport Department (TD) and ArchSD when planning the works project for a comprehensive consideration.

- Depending on the Government's arrangements and timetables for the future planning and development of "Tseung Kwan O Area 137", LCSD would timely take forward recreational and sports facility projects in the district, and consult the views of relevant stakeholders.

34. A Member continued to raise the following questions and views:

- They enquired when the number of recreational and sports facilities in Tseung Kwan O would meet the standards stipulated in HKPSG.
- While resources were being devoted to the planning of "Tseung Kwan O Area 137", which was still an uninhabited area, they suggested appropriately allocating resources to construct a sports centre in "Tseung Kwan O Area 86", which had a population of over 100 000.

35. Mr Jonathan HUNG of LCSD noted Members' views and responded as follows:

- LCSD was committed to providing quality and diverse recreational and sports facilities to meet public needs. When planning new facilities and enhancing the existing ones, LCSD would not only make reference to HKPSG, but also take into account various factors, such as policy objectives, the utilisation of existing recreational and sports facilities, demographic changes in the district, stakeholders' views, land availability, and technical feasibility. The aim was to assess the priorities and urgency of different projects under planning, thereby providing appropriate recreational and sports facilities for residents in the district.
- He reiterated that, under the Government's fiscal consolidation programme, the implementation programmes of individual projects under planning would be adjusted accordingly. LCSD would continuously review the implementation programme for the "Sports Centre in Tseung Kwan O Area 86" so as to make more effective use of public resources.
- The Government would reserve part of the land for the development of recreational and sports facilities in the planning of "Tseung Kwan O Area 137".

36. The Chairman asked LCSD to follow up Members' views.

37. There being no other comments from Members, the Chairman declared that the discussion item would be deleted at the next meeting.

(B) Enquire about the progress of the preliminary preparatory work and research for the indoor sports centre in LOHAS Park Area 86 (at the location of the "sea of flowers")
(SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 52/25)

38. The Chairman said that the discussion item was suggested by Mr Chris CHEUNG,

Mr WAN Kai-ming, Mr LI Tin-chi, Mr CHAN Chi-ho, Mr CHAN Kwong-fai, Ms TAM Chuk-kwan, Mr CHEUNG Chin-pang, Mr CHAU Ka-lok, Mr LAM Chun-ka, Mr WANG Wen, Mr CHEUNG Man-tim, Mr CHENG Yu-hei, Ms Christine FONG, Mr Kelvin YAU, Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Mr CHONG Yuen-tung and Mr Philip LI.

39. Members noted the written reply from LCSD (SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 55/25).

40. Members raised the following questions and views:

- The population of LOHAS Park (including Shek Kok Road, The Beaumont, Manor Hill and LOHAS Park) had exceeded 100 000. They hoped that the construction of the “Sports Centre in Tseung Kwan O Area 86” would be implemented promptly, and enquired about the progress of the planning work (for example, whether an underground car park would be included). They also proposed conducting a questionnaire survey or organising district consultation sessions regarding the works design as soon as possible to understand the community’s needs.
- They suggested that priority should be given to the construction of a covered footbridge connecting Shek Kok Road and LOHAS Park MTR Station, so as to facilitate access for the tens of thousands of residents in the vicinity of Shek Kok Road.

41. Mr Jonathan HUNG of LCSD noted Members’ views and responded as follows:

- As mentioned earlier, under the Government’s fiscal consolidation programme, LCSD would continuously review the implementation programme for the “Sports Centre in Tseung Kwan O Area 86” and suitably update the project timetable.
- When planning the “Sports Centre in Tseung Kwan O Area 86”, LCSD would review various factors for comprehensive consideration, and follow the public works procedures to timely consult the views of district stakeholders, including the views of SKDC.
- Regarding the proposed footbridge across Wan Po Road and the covered walkway serving other parts of “Tseung Kwan O Area 86”, LCSD would co-operate if any organisation or government department had feasible alternative plans to construct the covered walkway in the district, provided that the future development of the sports centre would not be affected. LCSD would also consider allocating a small portion of the land originally reserved for the works project for that construction purpose.

42. The Chairman asked LCSD to follow up Members’ views.

43. There being no other comments from Members, the Chairman declared that the discussion item would be deleted at the next meeting.

(C) Suggest providing seats on the pavements at Ngan O Road and Tan Cheung Road, and carrying out weed removal and paving works
(SKDC(DFWC) Paper No. 53/25)

44. The Chairman said that the discussion item was suggested by Ms Christine FONG, Ms TAM Chuk-kwan, Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Mr CHONG Yuen-tung, Mr CHAN Kwong-fai, Mr CHAN Chi-ho, Mr CHEUNG Chin-pang, Mr Chris CHEUNG, Ms Natasha YU, Mr Philip LI, Mr WANG Wen, Mr LI Tin-chi, Mr CHEUNG Man-tim, Mr CHENG Yu-hei, Mr Kelvin YAU and Mr WAN Kai-ming.

45. Members noted the written replies from TD and the Sai Kung District Office (SKDO) (SKDC(DFWC) Paper Nos. 56/25 and 57/25).

46. A Member raised the following questions and views:

- They suggested providing seats on the covered walkway along the pavement beside Ngan O Road (opposite Wo Ming Court) and sheltered seating on the Tan Cheung Road pavement (opposite Yee Hong Villa).
- They asked SKDO about the frequency of weed trimming on the Tan Cheung Road pavement, and suggested resurfacing the pavement with concrete to avoid overgrown weeds.

47. Mr CHEUNG Man-wai, Senior Inspector of Works (Sai Kung), SKDO responded as follows:

- SKDO would arrange for Members to conduct a site inspection at the Tan Cheung Road pavement, in order to confirm the exact proposed locations for resurfacing the pavement and installing sheltered seating.
- SKDO would conduct nine weed trimming operations annually, generally once every other month, and would increase the number of operations during the rainy season (between July and September every year) based on actual needs. Members were welcome to suggest other locations requiring weed trimming.

48. A Member further suggested that before installing sheltered seating on the Tan Cheung Road pavement, the views of nearby residents should first be sought and considered (for example, whether the location of sheltered seating would affect the privacy of neighbouring residences).

49. Mr CHEUNG Man-wai of SKDO noted and would follow up Members' views.

50. The Chairman asked TD and SKDO to follow up Members' views.

51. There being no other comments from Members, the Chairman declared that the discussion item would be deleted at the next meeting.

IV. Any Other Business

52. No other business was raised by Members.

V. Date of Next Meeting

53. The next meeting was scheduled for 10:00 a.m. on 11 November 2025 (Tuesday).
