## Welcome Remarks

The Chairman said a quorum was present and the meeting commenced officially.

2. The Chairman welcomed all Members and attendees to the meeting, in particular:

- Mr Edmond NG, District Environmental Hygiene Superintendent (Sai Kung), Food and Environmental Hygiene Department (FEHD), who took over the duties of Miss LAI Wing-sau, Winsy, on transfer;
- Dr WONG Hoi-kei, Senior Medical & Health Officer (Emergency Preparedness and District Relations)<sup>1</sup>; Dr Daisy KWAN, Medical & Health Officer (Emergency Preparedness and District Relations)<sup>4</sup>; Ms Joanna TAM, Chief Tobacco and Alcohol Control Inspector 1; and Mr Ricky CHEUNG, Senior Tobacco and Alcohol Control Inspector; of the Department of Health (DH);
- Mr Keith CHAN, Marine Officer/Pollution Control Unit (1); Mr LAU Kok-hei, Marine Officer/Harbour Patrol Section (1); Mr MA Chi-ping, Senior Assistant Shipping Master/Pollution Control Unit (2); and Mr LEE Tin-shing, Senior Assistant Shipping Master/Harbour Patrol Section (1); of the Marine Department (MD); and

### **I. Confirmation of Minutes of the 4<sup>th</sup> FEHC Meeting in 2025 held on 17 July 2025**

3. The Chairman said the Secretariat had not received any proposed amendment before the meeting. There being no proposed amendment at the meeting, the Chairman declared that the above minutes were confirmed.

### **II. New Item**

- (A) Summary of District Consultation on the “Issues of Concern to Sai Kung District in 2025 – Environmental Hygiene”  
(SKDC(FEHC) Paper No. 79/25)

4. The Chairman asked the representatives of SKDO to brief Members on the follow-up work of various departments regarding the “Issues of Concern to Sai Kung District in 2024 – Environmental Hygiene”.

5. Miss Crystal LUI, Assistant District Officer (Sai Kung)<sup>2</sup> (Designate), SKDO expressed her gratitude to FEHC Members for their proactive efforts in gathering public opinions on the “Issues of Concern to Sai Kung District in 2024 – Environmental Hygiene”, and for putting forward numerous practical and feasible suggestions with

specific details. From the 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting in 2024 to the 4<sup>th</sup> meeting in 2025 (9 meetings in total), FEHC had discussed and followed up a total of 16 environmental hygiene issues within the district. The Secretariat had relayed all Members' views to the relevant responsible departments for follow-up. In response to Members' views, the respective departments had paid extra attention and stepped up efforts in handling different environmental hygiene issues in the district. For example, the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department (AFCD) had conducted inter-departmental enforcement operations at Hang Hau MTR Station and strengthened publicity and education efforts to address the problem of feral pigeons; FEHD and the Housing Department (HD) had stepped up rodent and mosquito control work under their respective purview; the Environmental Protection Department (EPD) had continued to improve ancillary waste reduction and recycling facilities, and stepped up the promotion of environmental awareness; the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) had made enhanced publicity efforts in respect of noise nuisance; and SKDO had also co-ordinated multiple inter-departmental joint operations to clear illegally parked bicycles, as well as completing construction or improvement works for a number of small-scale drainage facilities in rural villages. The departments would continue to follow up the environmental hygiene issues in accordance with Members' views and the actual circumstances in the district.

6. The Chairman said that, starting from this meeting, FEHC would discuss the views collected on the "Issues of Concern to Sai Kung District in 2025". This meeting would first focus on discussing hygiene issues at piers and coastal areas, as well as issues related to smoking. The remaining environmental hygiene issues would be followed up at subsequent meetings.

7. Members noted the written replies from EPD, MD, the Drainage Services Department, the Tobacco and Alcohol Control Office (TACO) of DH, and FEHD (SKDC (FEHC) Paper Nos. 104/25, 105/25, 106/25, 114/25 and 115/25).

8. Members' views were consolidated as follows:

- They suggested EPD co-ordinate with relevant departments to trace the source of oil seepage from the cracks in the seawall at the Sai Kung Public Pier for ferries to Kau Sai Chau, as well as the source of suspected illegal sewage discharge (including tissues and other objects) near seafood restaurants in the Sai Kung town centre.
- They suggested strengthening efforts to clear refuse on the sea surface and along the shoreline near Wan Poon Path.
- They suggested TACO handle the problem of smoking at Po Lam Shopping Centre.
- They suggested TACO handle the problem of smoking on the footbridge at Sheung Tak Estate (near the off-course betting branch of The Hong Kong Jockey Club (HKJC)) and in the vicinity of Kin Fai House of Kin Ming Estate.

- They suggested deploying oil absorbent strips on a long-term basis at the Sai Kung Public Pier for ferries to Kau Sai Chau. Alternatively, other measures should be adopted to prevent the spread of oil pollution on the sea surface.
- Foreign domestic helpers would often gather at the LOHAS Park Station Public Transport Interchange and leave behind litter afterwards. Members suggested that the relevant departments should address the issue.

9. The Chairman suggested Members first focus on discussing hygiene issues at piers and coastal areas, as well as issues related to smoking. The remaining environmental hygiene issues could be addressed later.

10. Members further suggested TACO extend the no smoking area around Pak Tam Chung Bus Terminus in Sai Kung, so as to cover the area in front of the nearby snack shop.

11. Mr Keith CHAN, Marine Officer/Pollution Control Unit (1), MD said MD's primary duties were to clear marine refuse floating in Hong Kong waters and to handle oil spill incidents at sea. MD had repeatedly received reports in May this year about oil pollution in the waters near the Sai Kung Public Pier for ferries to Kau Sai Chau, after which MD staff were promptly deployed to the site for follow-up. On 29 May, MD conducted a site inspection with Members, and discovered that oil was seeping from the cracks in the seawall and accumulating on the sea surface. MD had deployed oil containment booms to surround the leaking section of the seawall, and used oil absorbent mats instead of oil absorbent strips to prevent further spread of the oil. At the same time, MD had referred the matter to the relevant departments to trace the source of the oil seepage onshore and stop the pollution at source. Additionally, regarding the refuse problem of the seafood restaurants mentioned by Members, MD could step up the clearance of marine refuse floating in the waters near the Sai Kung town centre and enhance publicity and education efforts. However, in order to tackle the problem at source, it should be referred to the relevant departments for follow-up actions.

12. Mr Raymond NG, Senior Environmental Protection Officer (Regional East)4, EPD said regarding the oil pollution on the sea surface off the Sai Kung Public Pier, EPD had adopted a science-based approach to investigate the source. The investigation included the use of ground penetrating radar (capable of reaching a maximum depth of 10 metres), unmanned underwater vehicles and unmanned aircrafts to assist in tracing the source of the oil pollution. No seepage or illegal drain connections were found during the investigation. EPD had also conducted a laboratory analysis of the relevant oil samples and ruled out the presence of diesel or petrol. According to the gas chromatography-mass spectrometry analysis, the oil samples were found to be broadly similar to the mosquito repellent oil samples. EPD would continue to monitor the situation. As for the issue raised by Members concerning suspected illegal sewage discharge by seafood restaurants in the Sai Kung town centre, EPD had not yet received any relevant information. EPD could conduct colour water tests in the area, and check whether any sewers had been incorrectly connected to stormwater drains if further information was available.

13. Mr Keith CHAN, Marine Officer/Pollution Control Unit (1), MD added that MD's foreshore cleaning teams were responsible for clearing marine refuse floating below the high water mark along seawalls, including those floating below the high water mark along Wan Poon Path.

14. Ms Joanna TAM, Chief Tobacco and Alcohol Control Inspector 1, DH responded as follows:

- In 2024, TACO received approximately 850 complaints in total about illegal smoking in Sai Kung District, conducted more than 980 inspections, and issued over 630 fixed penalty notices (FPNs) for smoking offences.
- Regarding the problem of smoking at Po Lam Estate and Po Lam Shopping Centre, TACO had received approximately 40 complaints as of August this year. The locations involved mainly included the rear staircase of Po Lam Shopping Centre, and the area outside the HKJC off-course betting branch. Pursuant to the Smoking (Public Health) Ordinance (Chapter 371) (the Ordinance), indoor areas in public places were statutory no smoking areas. "Indoor" was defined as: "(a) having a ceiling or roof, or a cover that functions (whether temporarily or permanently) as a ceiling or roof; and (b) enclosed (whether temporarily or permanently) at least up to 50% of the total area on all sides, except for any window or door, or any closeable opening that functions as a window or door." Certain areas of Po Lam Shopping Centre were indoor areas, while others were semi-open-air. The enclosed passageway next to the entrance of the HKJC off-course betting branch was a no smoking area. However, the area near the railings did not meet the definition of "indoor", and there were therefore enforcement constraints. TACO would arrange joint inspections with the management company and educate its staff to identify statutory no smoking areas.  
[Post-meeting note: TACO conducted a joint inspection with representatives of the management company on 19 September 2025.]
- Although some footbridges in housing estates had a cover, the degree of side enclosure was less than 50%. Therefore, those footbridges did not fall within the definition of a no smoking area. The footbridge connecting Metro City Plaza with Po Lam Shopping Centre met the definition of "indoor" due to its sufficient degree of enclosure. Hence, it was a statutory no smoking area. "No Smoking" signs had also been displayed on the footbridge. TACO staff had conducted site inspections at the footbridge but no violation had been found so far.
- She noted Members' suggestion to extend the no smoking area at Pak Tam Chung Bus Terminus in Sai Kung to cover the nearby snack shop. She would relay Members' views to the relevant section for consideration.
- Between 2024 and 2025, TACO had conducted publicity, education, and inspection activities in various public housing estates in the district, including Sheung Tak Estate and Po Lam Estate. Upon receiving complaints, TACO

staff would conduct site inspections and enforcement actions in accordance with the Ordinance.

15. Mr YEUNG Wong-pan, Senior Property Service Manager/Kowloon West & Sai Kung, HD said HD had been committed to providing residents with a smoke-free and comfortable living environment. In public housing estates under HD, all areas were no smoking areas except for the designated smoking areas. These no smoking areas included building lobbies, lift lobbies, staircases, and public open spaces such as parks. In addition, HD had implemented the Marking Scheme for Estate Management Enforcement in Public Housing Estates. Under the scheme, tenants who smoked in no smoking areas within the housing estates would be allotted five penalty points. Regarding the problem of smoking on the footbridge at Sheung Tak Estate and in the vicinity of Kin Fai House of Kin Ming Estate mentioned by Members, he would follow up with Members after the meeting to obtain further details. HD would focus on combating these smoking black spots.

16. Members further suggested EPD to check on the seawall at the Sai Kung Public Pier for ferries to Kau Sai Chau again, so as to identify the source of the oil pollution.

17. The Chairman enquired how the high water mark mentioned by MD was used to delineate the responsibilities between departments.

18. Mr Keith CHAN, Marine Officer/Pollution Control Unit (1), MD said MD was responsible for clearing marine refuse floating below the high water mark along seawalls, whereas work above the high water mark was the responsibility of the department that managed the location concerned.

19. The Chairman suggested EPD arrange for Members to conduct a site inspection at the Sai Kung Public Pier for ferries to Kau Sai Chau after the meeting, in order to thoroughly investigate the source of the oil pollution.

20. Members continued to express the following views:

- They suggested MD provide reference values or location data about the high water mark so as to clarify the division of responsibilities between various departments.
- They suggested the Link Asset Management Limited (Link) step up efforts in monitoring the problems of urination, smoking and foul odours at the rear staircase of the TKO Gateway car park.

21. Mr Keith CHAN, Marine Officer/Pollution Control Unit (1), MD said that in general, the darker part of a seawall (i.e. the area which was constantly submerged) fell below the high water mark.

22. The Chairman asked the Secretariat to relay Members' views on TKO Gateway to Link in writing.

23. Members continued to express the following views:

- They suggested FEHD and the Transport Department (TD) address the problem of littering by foreign domestic helpers after gatherings at the LOHAS Park Station Public Transport Interchange.
- They suggested SKDO step up efforts in monitoring the problem of illegally parked shared bicycles.
- They suggested EPD provide additional smart recycling bins at the shopping mall or community hall in LOHAS Park.
- They suggested FEHD install protective barriers against wild pigs around the rubbish bins in Tseng Lan Shue Village, or replace them with anti-tipping bins.
- They suggested SKDO increase the frequency of inter-departmental joint operations in order to step up the clearance of tents that had been left in Tong Ming Street Park for a prolonged period.
- They suggested EPD provide additional food waste smart bins in the vicinity of Sai Kung Old Town or Sai Kung Market.

24. The Chairman asked EPD, MD, TACO, HD, FEHD, TD, SKDO and the Sai Kung District Council Secretariat to follow up Members' views.

### **III. Report Items**

- (A) Statistics on Environmental Hygiene Service and Itinerant Hawkers in Sai Kung District  
(SKDC(FEHC) Paper Nos. 93/25 to 96/25)

25. Members' views were consolidated as follows:

- They enquired if FEHD had not issued any FPNs to dog owners for letting their dogs foul on streets between July and August in 2025.
- They asked FEHD for details about the two cases involving prosecution for mosquito and pest breeding.

26. Ms CHOW Yuk-chu, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)1, FEHD said during the report period, FEHD had not issued FPNs to dog owners for letting their dogs foul on streets.

27. Mr CHOW Wai-chung, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)2, FEHD said the two prosecution cases were instituted by FEHD for mosquitoes and pests found in construction sites in the district.

28. Members noted the above reports.

(B) Issues related to the operation of Temporary Fill Bank at Tseung Kwan O Area 137 and the South East New Territories Landfill (SKDC(FEHC) Paper Nos. 97/25 and 98/25)

29. Members suggested reviewing the cleansing arrangements for road sections towards the fill bank in Area 137 and the South East New Territories Landfill, and avoiding using traditional road cleansing methods as the residual water on roads might foul passing vehicles.

30. Ms CHOW Yuk-chu, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)1, FEHD noted Members' views and enquired about the specific locations of the road sections mentioned by Members.

31. The Chairman asked Members to provide additional information.

32. Members suggested relevant departments study the use of vacuum technology or high-pressure water jets to cleanse Wan Po Road.

33. Ms CHOW Yuk-chu, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)1, FEHD said FEHD would appropriately review the street cleansing arrangements and follow up with Members after the meeting.

34. Members continued to suggest relevant departments step up efforts to clear the litter on the Tseung Kwan O – Lam Tin Tunnel and the Cross Bay Link, Tseung Kwan O.

35. Ms CHOW Yuk-chu, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)1, FEHD added that the Civil Engineering and Development Department (CEDD) was responsible for cleansing the section of Wan Po Road from the fill bank to Chiu Shun Road with high-pressure water jets.

36. The Chairman said since no CEDD representative was sent to attend this meeting, he asked the Secretariat to relay Members' views to CEDD after the meeting to follow up and reply accordingly.

37. Members noted the above reports.

(C) Statistics on Enforcement Actions by the Agriculture, Fisheries and Conservation Department Against Illegal Feeding of Wild Pigeons in Sai Kung District (SKDC(FEHC) Paper No. 99/25)

38. Miss Crystal LUI, Assistant District Officer (Sai Kung)2 (Designate), SKDO enquired whether AFCD had plans to install a closed-circuit television (CCTV) system outside Hang Hau MTR Station to facilitate enforcement actions.

39. Dr Simon WONG, Veterinary Officer (Avian Influenza Surveillance), AFCD said AFCD had conducted a feasibility study on the installation of a CCTV system outside Hang Hau MTR Station, while also maintaining close communication with the MTR Corporation Limited. The first phase of the trial was currently planned to be carried out in the third quarter of the year.

40. Miss Crystal LUI, Assistant District Officer (Sai Kung)2 (Designate), SKDO asked the AFCD representative to timely report on the installation progress of the CCTV system.

41. Members noted the above report.

#### **IV. Discussion Items Suggested by Members**

- (A) Express concern over the emergence of Chikungunya fever and suggest stepping up mosquito prevention and control measures in Sai Kung District and the Tseung Kwan O area  
(SKDC(FEHC) Paper No. 100/25)

42. The Chairman said the discussion item was raised by Ms KI Lai-mei, Ms Christine FONG, Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Ms LI Ka-yan, Mr WAN Kai-ming, Mr CHEUNG Chin-pang, Mr CHENG Yu-hei, Ms TAM Chuk-kwan, Mr Chris CHEUNG, Mr CHAN Kwong-fai, Mr TSANG Kwok-ka, Ms Natasha YU, Mr WANG Wen, Mr CHONG Yuen-tung, Mr Philip LI, Mr LAM Chun-ka and Mr CHAU Ka-lok.

43. Members noted the written replies from DH, SKDO, HD, FEHD, LCSD and the Hospital Authority (SKDC(FEHC) Paper Nos. 103/25, 107/25 to 110/25, and 116/25).

44. Members suggested LCSD step up mosquito control efforts at Tseung Kwan O South Park. They also proposed that LCSD should consider placing Gravidtraps at venues under its management, and releasing relevant indices on mosquito infestation.

45. Mr CHOW Wai-chung, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)2, FEHD said FEHD had placed Gravidtraps outside some venues under LCSD and HD in the district. He would relay Members' suggestion to deploy Gravidtraps at Tseung Kwan O South Park to the relevant section for consideration.

46. Ms CHAN Mei-yee, Deputy District Leisure Manager (Sai Kung)2, LCSD said LCSD had been conducting weekly mosquito control work at Tseung Kwan O South Park. The relevant work would be stepped up in response to Members' suggestions.

47. Members further suggested FEHD state clearly the Gravidtrap indices of Tseung Kwan O South in the report.
48. Mr CHOW Wai-chung, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)<sup>2</sup>, FEHD noted Members' views, and would relay their views to the headquarters for consideration.
49. The Chairman asked LCSD and FEHD to follow up Members' views.
50. There being no other comments from Members, the Chairman declared that the discussion item would be deleted at the next meeting.
- (B) Suggest stepping up efforts to address the issue of water dripping from air conditioners in the Tseung Kwan O area  
(SKDC(FEHC) Paper No. 101/25)
51. The Chairman said the discussion item was raised by Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Mr CHENG Yu-hei, Mr LAM Chun-ka, Mr Chris CHEUNG, Mr TSANG Kwok-ka, Mr WAN Kai-ming, Ms Christine FONG and Ms TAM Chuk-kwan.
52. Members noted the written reply from FEHD (SKDC(FEHC) Paper No. 111/25).
53. Members enquired whether FEHD had applied infrared technology to identify the sources of water dripping from air conditioners in the district.
54. Ms CHOW Yuk-chu, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)<sup>1</sup>, FEHD said FEHD had used infrared night-vision cameras to facilitate investigations of sources of water dripping from air conditioners.
55. The Chairman asked FEHD to follow up Members' views.
56. There being no other comments from Members, the Chairman declared that the discussion item would be deleted at the next meeting.
- (C) Suggest relocating the refuse collection point next to the HHCKLA Buddhist Ching Kok Secondary School in Kin Ming Estate to tackle the problem of garbage and miscellaneous objects blocking the pavement and the school entrance/exit, thereby ensuring safe access by teachers and students as well as environmental hygiene  
(SKDC(FEHC) Paper No. 102/25)
57. The Chairman said the discussion item was raised by Ms Angel CHONG, Ms Christine FONG, Mr WANG Wen, Mr Philip LI, Mr CHONG Yuen-tung, Mr LAM Chun-ka, Mr Chris CHEUNG, Mr CHEUNG Man-tim, Mr CHAU Ka-lok, Mr CHAN Kwong-fai, Mr WAN Kai-ming, Mr WONG Yuen-hong, Mr CHENG Yu-hei and Ms TAM Chuk-kwan.

58. Members noted the written replies from FEHD and HD (SKDC(FEHC) Paper Nos. 112/25 and 113/25).

59. Members' views were consolidated as follows:

- Members suggested identifying a suitable location for relocating the junk collection point as soon as practicable. They also suggested repairing the partitions at the temporary refuse storage point.
- Members suggested avoiding refuse collection and handling right before and after school hours or during lunch hours. They also suggested pushing the wheeled refuse containers into the refuse collection point for handling to avoid causing street obstruction and odours.
- They suggested HD urge the management office of Kin Ming Estate to address the problem of leaking pipes in buildings.

60. Mr YEUNG Wong-pan, Senior Property Service Manager/Kowloon West & Sai Kung, HD said that, due to recent maintenance works of the underground refuse collection system in Kin Ming Estate, refuse from the affected buildings would be placed at the temporary refuse storage point at the entrance of Chui Ling Road for a short period of time before being picked up by refuse collection vehicles. HD had been maintaining close communication with the school to minimise the impact on students, teachers, parents and staff. The damaged parts of the junk collection point had already been repaired. Once the refuse collection system resumes operation, the temporary refuse storage point would cease to be used, and would be restored as junk collection point for tenants' use. HD would closely monitor tenants' usage and strengthen management to prevent accumulation of bulky household furniture waste outside the junk collection point. Regarding the issue of damaged pipes at Kin Ming Estate raised by Members, HD would collaborate with the estate management company to handle the matter promptly upon receiving maintenance request from tenants, with a view to resolving the cases of damaged pipes and water leakage in a timely manner.

61. Ms CHOW Yuk-chu, Chief Health Inspector (Sai Kung)1, FEHD said the current collection time for bulky refuse at Kin Ming Estate was from 9:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. FEHD would suitably adjust the collection time according to the needs of the school and the housing estate.

62. The Chairman asked HD and FEHD to follow up Members' views.

63. There being no other comments from Members, the Chairman declared that the discussion item would be deleted at the next meeting.

#### **V. Any Other Business**

64. No other business was raised by Members.

**VI. Date of Next Meeting**

65. The Chairman said the next meeting was scheduled for 10:00 a.m. on 13 November 2025.
