

**Sai Kung District Office  
Annual District Plan 2025-26**

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Annual District Plan 2025-26 of the Sai Kung District Office (SKDO).

**Work Targets**

2. SKDO will continue to be committed to promoting governance at the district level, enhancing the communication between the Government and the public, connecting with and caring for the public, and building a harmonious community. SKDO assists in publicising and explaining government policies on one hand, and gauging public opinions and local sentiments on the other. By ensuring effective two-way communication between the Government and the public, the Government will be able to formulate policies and provide services that better meet the public's needs as well as enhancing people's sense of achievement and satisfaction.

**(I) District Committees**

3. The District Committees under SKDO, including the Sai Kung District Fight Crime Committee, the Sai Kung District Fire Safety Committee, the Sai Kung Area Committee, the Tseung Kwan O (South) Area Committee and the Tseung Kwan O (North) Area Committee, make proactive efforts in community liaison and building, with a view to promoting continuous development of the district. The aforesaid committees will organise a wide range of activities in 2025-26, such as "LET'S SHINE Positive Life Singing Contest", "Youth Bazaar cum Mini Concert", "Tseung Kwan O (North) Golden Hits Concert", "Community Harmony Carnival" and "Hill Fire Prevention Publicity Campaign for Chung Yeung Festival 2025".

**(II) District Services and Community Care Teams (Care Teams)**

4. The formation of Care Teams seeks to consolidate community resources and forces to support the Government's district work and strengthen district networks. Care Teams will organise caring activities and assist in handling incidents and emergencies. Besides, Care Teams can help the Government disseminate information to the public and report the views of the public to the Government.

5. The 29 Care Teams of Sai Kung District have been in service for over a year, and their performance has been widely recognised. In 2025, the Care Teams of Sai Kung will continue to provide a variety of caring services to residents, with

the aim of building a caring community. The Care Teams will organise a number of activities in 2025, including care visits to households, simple home repairs, health talks, and festive activities.

### **(III) Celebration of the 76th Anniversary of the Founding of the People's Republic of China**

6. 1 October 2025 marks the 76th anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China. SKDO will organise a series of activities and publicity campaigns to celebrate the National Day with the public. The National Day celebrations this year will feature an array of events to encourage even more people to join and share the joy of the National Day. Examples of celebration events include "Lantern Display in Celebration of the National Day and Mid-Autumn Festival", "National Day Reception in Celebration of 76th Anniversary of the Founding of the People's Republic of China", "Poon Choi Banquet for the Elderly in Sai Kung and Tseung Kwan O", "Sai Kung Fun Day in celebration of National Day".

### **(IV) Celebration of the 28th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region**

7. The year 2025 also marks an important milestone for the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region as it reaches its 28th anniversary of establishment. SKDO will collaborate with local organisations to hold various large-scale celebration events including "Dragon Boat Carnival", Sai Kung District Soccer Tournament (6 teams invited) in Celebration of the 76th Anniversary of the Founding of the People's Republic of China", "Sai Kung District Variety Show" and hang national flags and regional flags in the district between June and July 2025, so as to spread the joy of Hong Kong's return to the Motherland among the local public.

### **(V) Youth Development**

8. Established under SKDO, the Sai Kung District Youth Development and Civic Education Committee and the Sai Kung District Youth Community Building Committee will continue their efforts in promoting youth work in the district. In 2025-26, the committees will organise activities including "Sai Kung Tseung Kwan O Outstanding Youth Commendation Scheme", "Support the 15th National Games of the PRC - Civic Education Drama Tour" and "Basic Law Orienteering Fun Day", arrange study visits to relevant exhibitions and facilities for local young people, participate in and promote community building, etc. SKDO will also subsidise schools, youth service centres and local organisations in the district to conduct various youth development programmes. In addition, SKDO will continue to implement the "Sai Kung Youth Ambassador Programme" to nurture youth leaders.

## **(VI) Promotion of Activities on Patriotic Education**

9. In order to further promote patriotic education at the district level, SKDO will join hands with numerous local organisations and schools of the district to organise publicity activities on patriotic education including activities in commemoration of the 80th anniversary of victory in the War of Resistance in 2025. These activities will be conducted in diverse forms to deepen participants' understanding of our country's history and culture as well as national affairs, and to enhance their recognition of traditional Chinese culture, thereby encouraging them to inherit and promote the spirit of patriotism.

## **(VII) Community Involvement Programme**

10. With a view to promoting community building and district harmony, SKDO implements the Community Involvement Programme (CIP) to provide funding to government departments, non-governmental organisations, the Sai Kung District Council (SKDC) or committees/working groups under SKDC/SKDO for implementing projects and activities relating to the promotion of sports, arts and culture, local events and celebration events, as well as greening and volunteer work, etc.

11. Among a wide variety of CIP activities and projects in Sai Kung District, SKDO and Po Leung Kuk (PLK) will co-organise "National Security in TKO, National Security in PLK" on 5 April 2025, promoting National Security Education Day to the locals in collaboration with PLK affiliated schools in the district. SKDO also held "Sai Kung District Chinese New Year Decoration" and "Sai Kung District Spring Reception" to enhance the festive atmosphere among the community and foster communications among government departments, SKDC, District Committees, rural committees, local organisations, local leaders and public utility companies. Other highlights include "Sai Kung Tin Hau Festival", "Halloween celebration event", Mini Concert & Carnival", activities celebrating Hong Kong's return to the Motherland and the National Day, and activities promoting patriotic education, etc.

## **(VIII) District-led Actions Scheme**

12. There are a total of four projects under the District-led Actions Scheme for 2025-26 in Sai Kung District, including (i) tackling street management problems - illegal shop front extensions and obstruction of public places; (ii) tackling illegal occupation of public roads to carry out recycling activities; (iii) clearance operations against indiscriminately parked bicycles; and (iv) enhancing mosquito control. SKDO will continue to take forward the relevant work projects in a proactive manner, and reinforce the effectiveness through communication with SKDC, members of the public, relevant industries and government departments, so as to further alleviate the long-standing, significant and thorny problems in the district.

## **(IX) District Minor Works Programme**

13. The District Minor Works (DMW) programme aims at improving local facilities, living environment and hygienic conditions in the territory to enhance the quality of people's lives. SKDO will continue to implement the DMW programme, the minor works projects identified therein include "Improvement and beautification works for the Tin Hau Temple in Fat Tong Mun", "Provision of distance posts at the foot of Ducking Hill", "Provision of drainage channel of Chi Fai Path, Tai Mong Tsai, Sai Kung", and provision of sitting-out facilities/rain shelters/other facilities, improvement of drainage facilities and pedestrian links, and beautification/greening works, etc.

## **(X) Rural Public Works Programme**

14. The Rural Public Works (RPW) programme aims at upgrading the infrastructure and improving the living environment of the rural community. SKDO will continue to implement the RPW programme in consultation with the RPW Sai Kung District Working Group, the works projects identified therein include "Improvement of access road near lamp post no. VA4549 at Tai Hang Hau, Hang Hau", "Improvement of access road and drainage channel near lamp post no. VA1502 at Luk Cheung Road, Sai Kung", and improvement of access road, footpath and drainage facilities, etc.

## **(XI) Election Work**

15. SKDO will assist the Registration and Electoral Office in the relevant publicity and preparation work for the 2025 Voter Registration Campaign and the 2025 Legislative Council General Election. Furthermore, the voter registration campaign for the Rural Representative Election will be initiated in April, when SKDO will start the voter registration and promotion work on the same day. The Rural by-election will be held in Apr/May.

## **(XII) Meet the Public Scheme**

16. SKDO will continue to assist SKDC in implementing the "Meet the Public Scheme", which will take place from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. every Wednesday in Tseung Kwan O and Sai Kung<sup>1</sup> on a rotational basis. The duty roster for "Meet the Public Scheme" in 2025 has been uploaded to the SKDC website.

### **(XIII) Building Management**

17. It has all along been the Government's policy to assist property owners in discharging their responsibilities for building management. As at late 2024, there were 151 owners' corporations and 61 owners' committees established among the private housing estates in Sai Kung District. In addition, SKDO has organised various educational activities for owners, such as inviting relevant departments to arrange briefing sessions, exhibitions and legal thematic talks, etc. to assist them in discharging their responsibilities for managing and maintaining their properties. For the enactment of the "Building Management (Amendment) Ordinance 2024" with effective from 13 July 2025, SKDO will strengthen the publicity and organise briefing. As always, SKDO will continue to render support to the owners of the private housing estates and assist them to perform their responsibilities for building management to better manage their properties.

### **Conclusion**

18. SKDO will continue its people-oriented approach and be strongly committed to driving forward the above work, with a view to building a more liveable and enjoyable Sai Kung District.

Annual District Plan 2025-26**

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Annual District Plan 2025-26 of the Wong Tai Sin and Sai Kung District Social Welfare Office (DSWO).

**District Needs and Work Objectives**

2. In the past few years, there have been rapid changes in social, economic and livelihood conditions. The living and mental health of citizens hinged on the influence of the complicated and ever-changing external environment and family relationship, and the elderly and persons with disabilities, along with their carers, were also facing different challenges. The work objectives of the DSWO are therefore promoting positive messages to enhance residents' mental wellness; strengthening support for the elderly, persons with disabilities, and caregivers through district collaboration; striving to enhance cooperation and experience sharing among social service units, encouraging cross-sector collaboration as well as promoting neighbourhood support, so as to build a friendly and harmonious community.

**(I) Family and Child Welfare Service**

3. To encourage families to face positively adversity and stresses, DSWO and the stakeholders will continue implementing the “Happy Living Community Campaign” to promote positive thinking to the public, and strengthen resilience of individual and families. The four Integrated Family Service Centres (IFSCs) in Sai Kung will continue to provide preventive, supportive and remedial services to facilitate family harmony, strengthen family cohesion, have early identification of deprived and at-risk families, and provide them with timely support. In addition, to echo the enactment of the Mandatory Reporting of Child Abuse Ordinance, IFSCs and Family and Child Protective Service Unit will continue to provide preventive, supportive and specialised services to victims of domestic violence and families in need, carry out publicity and public education work to combat domestic violence, organise seminars and workshops to enhance the identification and professional collaboration of professionals on child abuse cases.

## **(II) Rehabilitation Service**

4. To strengthen support for persons with disabilities, their caregivers and family members; promote social inclusion of persons with disabilities; strengthen support for people with mental or emotional problem, and enhance the service quality of frontline staff, DSWO will continue to publish the district-based newsletters periodically to provide updates on rehabilitation service units and community resources for residents, persons with disabilities, their caregivers and family members, in order to enhance their understanding in various rehabilitation and support services as well as their physical and mental well-being. In addition, DSWO encourages collaboration among rehabilitation service units, local organisations and stakeholders to showcase the multiple talents and capabilities of persons with disabilities, increase public understanding and acceptance of persons with disabilities, for building a caring, inclusive and equal community. Apart from the above, by means of public education and partnership programmes among service units and stakeholders, DSWO endeavoured to identify persons in mental recovery, with mental health or emotion problem at an early stage, in particular families and students with higher risks, and provide them with appropriate support and care. Workshops and sharing sessions will also be organised to enhance professional knowledge and skills of frontline workers.

## **(III) Elderly Service**

5. Through promoting the “Opportunities for the Elderly Project”, DSWO will continue to encourage elderly persons to actively participate in community activities to unleash their potentials, endure their contribution to society and embody positive aging. In addition, to step up concern and support for the elderly, particularly those singleton elders, doubleton elderly and their caregivers in the community, DSWO will continue to promote the “Care the Carer Campaign” for publicising the Government’s diverse measures on supporting the carers in need. DSWO will also initiate collaboration with district elderly centres and local stakeholders to launch different programmes or activities under the “Support for Carers Project” so as to knit up mutual support network intensely in the neighbourhood. Concurrently, the “District Services and Community Care Team - Supporting Elderly and Carers Scheme” will be further extended to identify and outreach to the elderly households in need and carers of elderly and cares of persons with disabilities for providing them with care and support and referring them to appropriate social service units.

## **(IV) Youth Service**

6. To promote physical health, mental well-being, resilience and to strengthen sense of belongings to the community, the DSWO organises various activities through district youth collaboration platforms and funding programmes. DSWO will continue to collaborate with Tseung Kwan O Hospital Community Adolescent Specialist Clinic through “The Referral Mechanism of Health and Emotion Support Service for

Adolescents” to facilitate frontline social workers to refer adolescents with emotional disturbance for early diagnosis and treatment. To help young people remain on the right track and resist temptation in cyber world, the DSWO will strengthen collaboration with the Police, the Education Bureau, the school, the Parent-Teacher Association, and youth service units to provide appropriate assistance and support to young people and their families.

#### **(V) Community Collaboration and Promotion of Volunteer Service**

7. DSWO will continue to strengthen service collaboration, promote volunteerism, mutual care and support in the community. By mobilising community resources, DSWO will continue to coordinate small community collaboration platforms, including the “Tsui Lam Service Collaboration Alliance” and the “Tseung Kwan O (South) Community Collaboration Network”; to promote collaboration among non-governmental organisations and stakeholders, aiming at identifying needy residents and assisting them as early as possible. Besides, DSWO will encourage social service units, local organisations and schools to organise volunteer training activities, inspiring members in the community to join volunteer service, promoting mutual care and support, cohesion and positive vibe in the community.

**Leisure and Cultural Services Department  
Annual District Plan 2025-26**

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Annual District Plan 2025-26 of the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD).

**Recreation and Sports Programmes**

2. Committed to promoting “Sport for All”, the LCSD provides people of varying ages and physical abilities in the district with diversified recreation and sports programmes, in a bid to encourage the public to get into the habit of regular participation in sports and physical activities and lead a healthy lifestyle in furtherance of the “Sport for All” policy. The Sai Kung District Leisure Services Office of the LCSD has drawn up an annual plan for the organisation of recreation and sports programmes for 2025-26, with about 1 668 programmes anticipated to be organised throughout the year for about 120 447 participants. Details of such programmes are at **Annex I**.

**Cultural Programmes**

3. In 2025-26, LCSD planned to present “18dART – Community Arts Scheme”, “Community Cultural Ambassador Scheme”, “School Performing Arts in Practice Scheme”, “Arts Experience Scheme for Senior Secondary Students”, Music Office Music Promotion Activities etc. in Sai Kung District, to encourage the community members and art groups to participate in performing arts activities and to cultivate the community members and students’ interest in performing arts. It is anticipated that approximately 79 performing arts activities will be held throughout the year, with about 11 230 participants. The planned programmes are listed at **Annex II**.

## **Library Extension Activities**

4. The LCSD regularly organises a variety of extension activities in public libraries in the Sai Kung District to encourage the use of library facilities and promote lifelong learning among members of the public and students in particular, as well as to foster a reading culture in the community. A total of 753 district-based activities are planned to be held in public libraries in the Sai Kung District for 2025-26, with an estimated attendance of about 591 230. Details of the district-based activities are at **Annex III**.

**Work Targets**

2. SKDSDS is committed to forging a closer partnership with the schools of Sai Kung District and providing comprehensive and integrated services to the schools and the public at the district level.

## **(I) Education Initiatives**

### Implementing policies

4. SKDSDS makes every effort to promote and implement policies/initiatives under the Education Reform and Curriculum Reform. It supports schools in their implementation of the policies/initiatives. SKDSDS also explains education policies/initiatives to the community, including District Council members and related sub-committees members, and enlists their support for implementation.

### Overseeing the quality of education in schools

5. EDB has introduced the School Development and Accountability (SDA) framework to publicly-funded schools since the 2003/04 school year, with a view to supporting schools to manifest the spirit of school-based management (SBM), thereby promoting their perpetual development and self-improvement and enhancing their accountability and transparency through school self-evaluation (SSE). External School Review (ESR) has then been adopted as an external quality assurance mechanism to validate the effectiveness of the SSE. To tie in with the announcement of “The Chief Executive's 2022 Policy Address” to strengthen the SBM, the EDB launched the enhanced SDA framework to bolster the accountability of staff in publicly-funded schools in providing quality school education and enhancing the national education through the adoption of a whole-school approach. Starting from the second term of the 2023/24 school year, the EDB has uploaded the concluding chapter of the ESR reports to the EDB website for public information. SKDSDS will continue to provide professional support to schools in Sai Kung District on administration matters as well as learning and teaching.

## **(II) School Aspect**

### National Security Education

6. National Security Education (NSE) is an important component of values education. It is inseparable from national education and an indispensable part of school curriculum. In order to support schools to promote NSE, the EDB has consolidated resources related to NSE on the EDB website to facilitate schools' searching for the resources. Teachers can also visit the “National Education One-stop Portal” website to search for other resources related to national education.

## Regulating schools

7. In order to ensure schools' compliance with the Education Ordinance, the Education Regulations, relevant policies and guidelines, SKDSDS will continue to conduct school inspections and visits.

### **(III) Teacher Aspect**

#### Organising networking activities

8. With a view to promoting quality education, SKDSDS will keep the momentum to create opportunities for networking teachers/schools and to facilitate professional development of teachers for dissemination of good practices and experience sharing at the district level. In 2025-26, SKDSDS will continue to meet the development needs of schools in the Sai Kung District and to collaborate with the principal associations in Sai Kung District to organise district-based networking activities in the themes of "mental health" and "anti-drug education".

### **(IV) Student Aspect**

#### Providing placement services

9. The EDB is committed to providing 12-year's free primary and secondary education to all eligible local children through public sector schools. Eligible children from the age of 6, have the right to enjoy basic education in public sector schools. Under the existing policy, all parents must send their children (aged 6 to 15) to attend schools. Under the principle of upholding students' rights to education, SKDSDS will continue to provide placement services to newly arrived children and other students who require assistance.

### **(V) Parent Aspect**

#### Home-school co-operation and parent education

10. Parents play a vital role in their children's development and learning. In promoting home-school co-operation and parent education, the EDB's major strategy is to forge home-school partnership through the platform of kindergartens, primary and secondary schools to

facilitate students' effective learning and healthy development. The Government also provides Parent-Teacher Associations (PTAs) of schools with funding to encourage schools to set up PTAs and organise home-school co-operation activities and/or parent education programmes or activities. SKDSDS will continue to support the activities organised by the Federation of Parent-Teacher Associations of the Sai Kung District, in order to promote positive attitudes among parents towards home-school co-operation and parent education.

## **Conclusion**

11. SKDSDS will continue to promote education development in Sai Kung District, as well as to provide appropriate support services to meet the needs of students, teachers, schools and other stakeholders related to education matters in the district.

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Annual District Plan 2025-26 of the Drainage Services Department.

**(A) Projects under design**

272DS & 273DS Port Shelter sewerage, stage 2 & Port Shelter sewerage, stage 3

The construction of 8 pumping stations, 1 package sewage treatment plant and about 24 km of sewers at 22 unsewered village areas in Sai Kung.

448DS Rehabilitation and construction of sewage rising mains (Package 3) – Sai Kung, Tai Po and Sha Tin

The rehabilitation and construction of 2 sections of rising mains of about 0.6 km in Sai Kung District.

182CD Drainage improvement works in Sha Tin and Sai Kung

Phase 1 – Construction of about 300 m stormwater drain and 1km channel at Po Lo Che;

Phase 2 – Construction of about 400 m stormwater drain at Ho Chung, 200 m stormwater drain and modification of existing channel at Wong Chuk Wan.

**(B) Projects under construction**

214DS Tseung Kwan O Sewerage for Villages

The construction of village sewerage systems comprising about 6.4 km sewers and a pumping station at Au Tau with 0.7 km of twin rising mains for 10 unsewered areas / villages in Tseung Kwan O.

362DS Sewerage for Ma Yau Tong Village

The construction of a village sewerage system comprising about 4.8 km sewers for Ma Yau Tong Village.

431DS & 432DS Port Shelter sewerage, stage 2, package 3 & Port Shelter sewerage, stage 3, package 2

The construction of 2 pumping stations, 2 sewage treatment plants and about 20 km of sewers at 7 unsewered village areas in Sai Kung.

172CD Rehabilitation of Underground Stormwater Drains – Remaining Works

To rehabilitate about 19 km of stormwater drains in Central & Western, Wan Chai, Eastern, Southern, Islands, Tuen Mun, Yuen Long, North, Tai Po, Sha Tin, Kwun Tong and Sai Kung districts. Among these, the proposed works in Sai Kung District comprises rehabilitation of about 1.1 km underground stormwater drains.

414DS Rehabilitation of Underground Sewers – Remaining Works

To rehabilitate about 5 km of underground sewers in Central & Western, Wan Chai, Eastern, Southern, Islands, Tuen Mun, Yuen Long, North, Tai Po, Sha Tin, Kwun Tong and Sai Kung districts. Among these, the proposed works in Sai Kung District comprises rehabilitation of about 370 m underground sewers.

4200CD Drainage improvement works in Sha Tin and Sai Kung – phase 1

The construction of 1.1km total length of u-channel ranging from 200mm to 700 mm in width and 1050mm diameter stormwater drainage pipes at Po Lo Che Road.



**Environmental Protection Department  
Annual District Plan 2025-26**

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Annual District Plan 2025-26 of the Environmental Protection Department (EPD).

**Work Targets**

2. The EPD is mainly responsible for enforcing pollution control legislations, implementing policies on environmental protection, and handling pollution complaints in Sai Kung District through its Regional Office (East). Besides, in order to facilitate environmental compliance, EPD has established partnership programmes with trades and offered assistance and advice on compliance related matters. Moreover, activities are also organised with District Councils and local communities to promote public awareness and concern for environmental matters.

3. EPD will continue to keep a close watch on pollution problems in the district. Our primary action items are as follows:

**(I) To enforce pollution control legislation**

4. To implement control over polluters by enforcing pollution control legislation; and to manage and monitor pollution problems in the district through different permit and licensing systems.

**(II) To address community needs and handle pollution complaints**

5. To provide prompt response to enquiries and complaints about pollution in the district through a hotline service; to conduct investigation under our purview and prosecute offenders.

6. Priority item for 2025-26 would include various anti-flytipping measures in the district including ambush operations to flytipping hotspots for around 8 times a month and installation of CCTV surveillance cameras at strategic locations.

**(III) To partner with various trades in promoting environmental compliance.**

7. To form partnership with trades and to enhance their knowledge on environmental protection and promote environmental compliance through seminars, guidelines or liaison meetings.

8. Priority item for 2025-26 would include displaying education banners along Wan Po Road; distributing leaflet as well as issuing reminder notes to landfill users without proper cover for their transported waste at entrance of the South-East New Territories landfill extension to arouse awareness of heavy vehicle drivers on environmental hygiene issues.

**(IV) To arouse public awareness on environmental protection**

9. The EPD will continue to promote waste reduction and recycling. Initiatives include expanding the community recycling network and strengthening promotion and education on waste reduction and recycling for the public and at school level to encourage members of the public to integrate waste reduction and recycling into their daily lives.

10. Priority item for 2025-26 would include the following:

- The EPD has set up Recycling Stores in 50 public rental housing (PRH) estates to facilitate residents living in the PRH estates and nearby to practise clean recycling. The Recycling Stores GREEN@SHEUNG TAK in Sheung Chun House, Sheung Tak Estate and GREEN@KIN MING in Ming Yu House, Kin Ming Estate have commenced operation in April 2024. The EPD also plans to optimise the service hours of the Recycling Stores in PRH estates to provide better service;
- To facilitate members of public who need to work during daytime, GREEN@PO LAM has extended the operating hours since November 2024 by 3 hours, extended from 9am - 7pm to 8am - 9pm. Other Recycling Stores will extend the operating hours progressively. In addition, the EPD has launched a trial for night-time recycling spots since mid-2024. Two of them are located in Sai Kung District: Ma Yau Tong Village (Every Monday, 17:00 to 20:00) and Tai Po Tsai Village (Every Tuesday, 17:00 to 20:00);
- In addition, the EPD will continue to implement "We-recycle@School" Activity launched in March 2024 to encourage students to actively practise waste reduction and recycling together with their family members. Currently, over 500 primary and

secondary schools have participated in the Activity, including more than 20 primary and secondary schools in Sai Kung.

**Work Targets**

2. In 2025-26, HD is committed to providing quality homes, promoting sustainable living, optimising and rationalising the use of public resources, as well as implementing various estate maintenance and improvement works.

**(I) Providing Quality Homes**

3. To provide affordable rental housing to low-income families with housing needs, and to help low- to middle-income families gain access to subsidized home ownership.

- To provide public rental housing (PRH) to low-income families who cannot afford private rental accommodation.
- To offer subsidised sale flats (SSF) for sale and implement White Form Secondary Market Scheme (WSM).
- To put up for sale of unsold Tenants Purchase Scheme (TPS) flats.

**(II) Promoting Sustainable Living**

4. To enhance the sense of well-being of public housing residents through improving the design for public spaces, facilities and estate environment.

- To implement the Marking Scheme for Estate Management Enforcement, and strengthen the prevention and control of pest and rodents in PRH estates.
- To provide an age-friendly and barrier-free estate environment to address the needs of residents of different ages and physical ability.

### **(III) Optimising and Rationalising the Use of Public Resources**

5. To strengthen tenancy management and prevent abuse of public housing resources.

- To enhance public awareness of the proper use of public housing resources, and enlist their support to combat abuse of PRH.
- To prevent and detect tenancy abuse through routine flat visits, investigation on the income and asset declarations under the "Well-off Tenants Policies" and the declaration on occupancy status and particulars of domestic property ownership in Hong Kong.
- To launch the "Cherish Public Housing Resources Award Scheme" to offer rewards to persons who provide concrete intelligence that leads to identification of substantiated tenancy abuse of PRH.

### **(IV) Implementing various estate maintenance and improvement works**

6. Implement timely maintenance and proper improvement works to ensure a safe and pleasant living environment for the residents.

### **Civil Engineering and Development Department Annual District Plan 2025-26 for Sai Kung and Tseung Kwan O**

#### **Purpose**

This paper aims to report the progress of project items carried out by the Civil Engineering and Development Department (CEDD) in Sai Kung and Tseung Kwan O (TKO) in 2025-26.

#### **(I) Projects under Design**

I. 7892CL & 7895CL - Development at TKO Area 137 and Development off TKO Area 132

2. As set out in the 2022 Policy Address, TKO Area 137 will be developed into a new community primarily for housing purpose, providing about 50 000 residential units. Subsequent to the announcement of the Preliminary Outline Development Plan for the development at TKO Area 137 and off TKO Area 132 in early 2023, we announced the enhanced land creation proposal and the Recommended Outline Development Plan, and attended the Sai Kung District Council (SKDC) meeting in November 2024. We also conducted two information sessions in December 2024 to introduce the enhanced land creation proposal to local stakeholders.

3. In early 2025, we exhibited the EIA report of the project under the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Ordinance. We will commence progressively relevant statutory procedures and gazettal arrangements in relation to amendments to the approved TKO Outline Zoning Plan, and reclamation, road and sewerage works as per the respective regulations to invite public comments. We target to commence phased construction in end 2025 upon completion of necessary procedures, with first population intake at TKO Area 137 in 2030.

#### **(II) Works under Construction**

I. 716CL - TKO Further Development - Infrastructure Works for TKO Stage I Landfill Site (Remaining Works)

4. The project provides infrastructure for supporting the recreational development at TKO Stage I landfill site. The works mainly include the

construction of a footbridge spanning over the Eastern Channel, and a sewage pumping station and related sewerage facilities. The TKO Promenade Southern Bridge was opened for public use in February 2024. The sewage pumping station and related sewerage facilities were substantially completed by the end of 2024. Subsequent testing and commissioning works with the maintenance department are in progress.

II. 808CL - Site Formation and Infrastructure Works for Public Housing Developments at TKO

5. The project provides land for residential housing development, involving site formation and infrastructure works for the public housing development site at Northwest of Ying Yip Road, West of Yau Yue Wan Village and East of Hong Kong Movie City. The works are anticipated for completion in 2026.

III. 5058TF - Improvement Works at Kau Sai Village Pier

6. The related works were completed in May 2024 and opened to public in September in the same year.

IV. 5057TF - Improvement Works at Leung Shuen Wan Pier

7. CEDD awarded the works contract and targeted for completion in second half of 2025. The scope of the works comprises:

- (i) reconstruction of the existing pier (including provision of berthing spaces, access ramp and ancillary facilities such as roof cover, lighting system, benches, solar panels, Wi-Fi device, etc.); and
- (ii) environmental mitigation measures and monitoring for the proposed works.

V. 803CL - Development of Anderson Road Quarry Site – Site Formation and Associated Infrastructure Works

8. The project aims to provide land for residential housing development, commercial uses, government, institution or community facilities, a quarry park, a quarry lake, open spaces and amenity areas. The construction of site formation and associated infrastructure works was completed in phases since 2022<sup>1</sup>.

VI. 818CL - Development of Anderson Road Quarry Site – Road Improvement and Infrastructure Works

9. The project implements a series of off-site road improvement works and pedestrian connectivity facilities to mitigate the potential traffic impact arising from the population intake of the development of Anderson Road Quarry site. The road improvement works were completed in phases starting from 2023. 2 out of 4 pedestrian connectivity facilities (PCF) were completed and opened to the public in September 2021 and December 2022 respectively<sup>2</sup>. The remaining two PCFs at On Sau Road connecting to the development area were completed in June 2023 and December 2024 respectively, and are anticipated to be opened to the public in the first quarter of 2025 to match with the population intake programme of the related housing development.

VII. 7851CL & 5792CL - Joint Cavern Development at Anderson Road Quarry Site

10. The project aims to construct the Public Works Central Laboratory (for accommodating the Public Works Central Laboratory at Kowloon Bay that will be demolished afterward) and the Government Records Service's Archives Centre inside the caverns formed in rock slope of Tai Sheung Tok at the Anderson Road Quarry Development Site. The works are scheduled for completion in 2028.

In 2025-26, PlanD will amend Tseung Kwan O Outline Zoning Plan (OZP) to take forward the development project of Tseung Kwan O Areas 137 and 132 and process the representation(s) in respect to the amendments to the Ho Chung OZP. Consultation with Sai Kung District Council and Rural Committees will be taken as appropriate.

**(II) Development Control**

4. PlanD will continue to process development proposals in Sai Kung and Tseung Kwan O, including the processing of planning applications, reviews and appeal under the Town Planning Ordinance. PlanD will also continue to provide statutory planning comments to development proposal in other aspects including consultancy studies, building plans, applications related to land administration and government works, etc.

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Annual Formation Action Plan 2025-26 of the Hong Kong Police Force (Tseung Kwan O District).

**Fight Crime**

2. Adopt a three-pronged approach of Enforcement, Education and Publicity, and Multi-agency Collaboration to enhance the prevention and detection of technology crime and deception.
3. Collaborate with property management companies and other stakeholders to prevent and swiftly investigate cases involving illegal debt collection activities and burglaries through Project CHECKMATE, Operation HILLCASTLE, Operation BACKSTEPPER and Project SYNERGY.
4. Strengthen the intelligence network and mount proactive operations with a view to deterring quick cash crime and youth crime.
5. Collaborate with stakeholders in the community to raise public awareness of crime prevention and enhance youths' law-abiding awareness through the TKO's FOOTPRINTS.

**Public Safety**

6. Enhance the District's capability and preparation to ensure public events, large-scale sports (such as the 15th National Games), entertainment and celebration events are held in a safe and orderly manner.
7. Promote countryside visitors, pedestrians, cyclists and other road users' safety (especially elderly) through a multi-agency approach to reduce fatal and serious traffic accidents and ensure smooth traffic flow.
8. Enhance the District's capability in dealing with incidents in rural areas through utilizing the Rural Patrol Cadre and officers' capability to handle incidents under extreme weather with a view to safeguarding and protecting life and property and resuming normality through cross-departmental collaboration.

9. Ensure the District is fully prepared for the relocation of the Immigration Department Headquarters to Tseung Kwan O and prepare for policing challenges arising from the organizational restructuring and incidents at MTR system in the District.

### **National Security**

10. Collect intelligence concerning national security and refer it to the National Security Department for action.

11. Enhance officers' capability and sensitivity in handling national security incidents, including any incident arising from the legislation of BL23.

12. Co-operate with stakeholders in safeguarding national security and handling national security incidents in a swift and decisive manner.

13. Enhance cooperation with schools and different stakeholders to foster positive values and a sense of national identity among students and above all, to enhance their law-abiding awareness.

Sai Kung Division Operational Priorities 2025-26**

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Operational Priorities 2025-26 of the Hong Kong Police Force - Sai Kung Division (SKDIV).

**Work Targets**

2. The operational priorities set out the key operational areas which SKDIV will accord priority to during the year. They are a continuation of the priorities identified last year with refinements to reflect our current operating environment and key challenges in the year ahead.

**(I) National Security**

3. SKDIV will take initial actions to respond to national security related reports, as well as collect intelligence and information concerning national security and refer it to the National Security Department for actions. SKDIV will also enlist the public's trust and support for the roles and responsibilities of the Police in safeguarding national security.

**(II) Violent Crime**

4. SKDIV will ensure effective police presence to deter violent crime, particularly at high risk locations. Intelligence-led operations will be strengthened against street gangs and illegal debt collection activities, particularly those involving students and youths.

**(III) Triads, Syndicated And Organised Crime**

Triads

5. SKDIV will target triad personalities and activities, in particular those exploiting students and youths, by mounting intelligence-led operations.

### Syndicated and Organised Crime

6. Personalities and activities associated with syndicated or organised crime will be targeted, particularly those related to illegal debt collection, robbery, burglary, smuggling and unlawful gambling establishment/ unlicensed upstairs bars.

### Crime Proceeds and Money Laundering

7. A proactive approach will be taken to investigate money laundering and to confiscate proceeds of crime.

### **(IV) Dangerous Drugs**

8. SKDIV will strengthen intelligence-led operations against drug traffickers, especially those exploiting students and youths. A multi-agency and community-based approach will also be taken to promote awareness and prevent the abuse of drugs by students and youths.

### **(V) Deception and Quick Cash Crime**

9. SKDIV will continue to raise awareness and garner support to prevent deception and quick cash crime, particularly telephone, Internet and social media deception. Criminal groups involved in deception will be targeted through joint efforts with stakeholders, supported by the Anti-Deception Coordination Centre. Strategic deployment of resources to blackspots of quick cash crime will also be ensured and SKDIV will take proactive measures including intervention with potential victims and cyber patrol against emerging trends of deception.

### **(VI) Cyber Security and Technology Crime**

10. A multi-agency approach will be taken to enhance the awareness of cyber security and the risk associated with the internet and social media. Cooperation with other law enforcement agencies and stakeholders will also be enhanced to target technology crime. Proactive measures will also be taken to investigate and gather intelligence against technology crime.

### **(VII) Public Safety**

#### Public Disorder

11. SKDIV will enhance preparedness, readiness and capability in dealing with all scales of public disorder, and to provide rapid and effective response to all

scales of public disorder.

#### Public Events

12. SKDIV will continue to engage organisers, the media and other stakeholders to enhance support and mutual understanding of respective roles and responsibilities. SKDIV will also ensure that public events, large-scale sports, entertainment and celebration events are held in a safe and orderly manner, through proactive engagement and coordination with relevant stakeholders, including police headquarters' units, event organisers, venue operators and different government bureaux/departments for effective planning and execution.

13. Intelligence-led operations against groups and or individuals causing or threatening violence during public events will be strengthened, and resolute action will be taken to interdict such activities.

#### Road Safety

14. SKDIV aims to reduce fatal and serious traffic accident, especially those involving the elderly, public transport, cycling and goods vehicles, through a multi-agency approach. SKDIV will also deter drink driving, drug driving, speeding, driving while disqualified and illegal road racing.

15. SKDIV will continue to promote safe cycling and pedestrian safety, with particular emphasis on the elderly. SKDIV will also ensure smooth traffic flow through, particularly in areas that often encounter gridlock, through the effective application of STEP, community engagement and technology.

#### Major Incidents & Extreme Weather

16. SKDIV will conduct regular multi-agency training and exercises to ensure a high level of preparedness, responsiveness and recovery capabilities in the event of major incidents and extreme weather.

### **(VIII) Terrorism**

#### Prevention

17. SKDIV will strengthen the protection of critical infrastructure and sensitive premises through a multi-agency approach, as well as enhancing the awareness of both the public and frontline officers of terrorism, including domestic terrorism and self-radicalization.

### Preparedness, Response and Recovery

18. Regular training and multi-agency exercises will be conducted to test and improve contingency plans. SKDIV will also enhance the preparedness of both the public and officers to provide a rapid response to and recovery from terrorist incidents.

### **(IX) Policing of the 15<sup>th</sup> National Games**

19. SKDIV will ensure the 15<sup>th</sup> National Games and the related events are held in a safe, orderly and secure manner.

### **Conclusion**

20. Officers of SKDIV will continue serving Hong Kong with honour, duty and loyalty. Successful implementation of the priorities will strengthen our abilities to sustain efforts for maintaining a safe and stable Hong Kong.

Annual District Plan 2025-26**

**Purpose**

This paper aims to set out the Annual District Plan 2025-26 of the Transport Department (“TD”) in Sai Kung District.

**Work Targets**

2. The TD strives to maintain the traffic and continuously enhance various public transport services to meet the commuting needs of passengers by managing road traffic, regulating public transport services, as well as planning for the future to cope with the growth in demand for transport facilities and services, etc.

**(I) Bus Route Planning Programme for Sai Kung District**

3. The TD and the franchised bus companies will submit annual programme on the proposed changes in franchised bus services for the coming two years in response to the new developments and changes in population in the district. Service improvement, introduction of new routes and bus-bus interchange schemes, and service rationalization proposals will be made and implemented to meet passenger demand and to enhance the efficiency of bus network. The TD expects to submit the Bus Route Planning Programme for Sai Kung District 2025-26 to the Traffic and Transport Committee in the first quarter of 2025 for discussion. The TD expects to report the result of consultation to the Traffic and Transport Committee in mid-2025, and to implement the settled items when appropriate.

**(II) Major Changes in Public Transport Services**

4. To ensure public transport services match changes in passenger demand, the TD will continue to monitor the provision of public transport services in the district. Consultation with the Traffic and Transport Committee on major changes in public transport services will be conducted to ensure that services provided would meet passenger demand.

**(III) Road Improvement Works**

5. To upgrade, improve and expand the existing road network to cope with demand, the TD will continue to monitor the traffic conditions in the district. Necessary improvement (both major and minor) will be planned and implemented

to cater for possible traffic growth. It is expected that the following major improvement works will commence:

- (i) Road improvement works in the roundabout near Clear Water Bay Road and Ying Yip Road to provide an exclusive left turn lane;
- (ii) Signalising the Pedestrian Crossing at Clear Water Bay Road near Razor Hill Road;
- (iii) Relocation of Taxi Stand and General Loading/unloading Area, and Designation of Goods Vehicle Only Loading/Unloading Area at Chan Man Street;
- (iv) "Dualling of Hiram's Highway from Marina Cove to Sai Kung Town", which the design and construction contract commenced in December 2024;
- (v) Provision of motor cycle parking spaces near Yau Yue Wan Village; and
- (vi) Provision of cycling tracks at Po Hong Road outside Tseung Kwan O Sports Ground.

#### **(IV) Traffic Management Scheme**

6. To ensure the safe and efficient use of the existing road network, the TD will review major road junctions and speed limits where appropriate to improve traffic condition and road safety.

#### **Conclusion**

7. The TD will continue to driving forward related tasks to facilitate the commuting of citizens.
