## Action

### I Opening Remarks and Introduction

The Chairman welcomed the Members and representatives from the government departments to the 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Tsuen Wan District Council (TWDC) and then introduced them one by one.

2. The Chairman reminded Members that according to section 28 of the Tsuen Wan District Council Standing Orders, unless otherwise agreed by the Chairman, each Member could speak and make supplementary remarks once for each agenda item at the meeting and Member could speak up to 3 minutes.

### II Item 1: Confirmation of Minutes of the 1<sup>st</sup> Meeting held on 7 January 2016

3. The Chairman said that the Secretariat had not received any proposed amendments to the minutes before this meeting. The minutes were confirmed without amendment.

### III Item 2: Matters Arising from the Minutes of the Previous Meetings

4. The Chairman said that there were no matters arising from the minutes of the previous meeting.

### IV Item 3: Crime Brief for Tsuen Wan District - Comparison of Crime Statistics between October to December 2015 and October to December 2014 (TWDC Paper No. 9/2016)

5. District Commander (Tsuen Wan) of the Hong Kong Police Force (HKPF) reported on the situation of crime in Tsuen Wan district.

6. Mr CHAN Yuen-sum, Sumly hoped that the Police would continue to keep an eye on the perennial gambling problem in Lei Muk Shue Estate. He pointed out that gambling was often seen in the locations between Yeung Shue House, Toa Shue House and Fung Shue House, triggering security concerns. He further said that recently, it was from time to time found that strangers entered the buildings of Lei Muk Shue Estate and look around on various floors there, sparking worries that they were planning for crimes. He therefore hoped that the Police would pay attention to this matter and step up patrol in the areas of Lei Muk Shue Estate, Kwok Shui Road, village houses on Lei Shu Road, and Primrose Hill.

7. Mr LAM Faat-kang noted that the crime figures for end of the Lunar Year showed a declining trend. In view of this, he praised the Police for its efforts, not least in tackling the disturbance on the first day of the Lunar New Year (LNY).

8. Mr LO Siu-kit thanked the Police for its hard work, as the crime figures for his constituency, Tak Wah, significantly dropped from 179 cases for October to December 2014 to 139 cases for the same period of 2015. He said that there had been illegal hawking and illegal shop extension in the areas of Yeung Uk Road, Ho Pui Street, Chuen Lung Street and Tai Uk Street during the LNY; but fortunately, the Police had made prompt responses and conducted two operations together with officers of the Food and Environmental Hygiene Department (FEHD) in January this year to distribute leaflets and give advice at the above locations. He had also learnt that the Police and the FEHD would carry out large-scale joint operations later. In this connection, he expressed gratitude to the Police and the FEHD for deploying manpower to strengthen street management during the LNY and hence, reduce traffic accidents.

9. Ms LAM, Lam Nixie thanked the Police and the Fire Services Department (FSD) for their work in advising the public not to go up Tai Mo Shan over the previous two days. She hoped the officers concerned would not get injured in their work. She indicated that illegal parking was serious in her constituency. While understanding that it was a difficult problem to solve due to environmental factors, she hoped that the Police would take targeted actions to eradicate illegal parking in the future. Besides, she said residents of City Point had earlier reported to her that some South Asians recently gathered outside the MTR Tsuen Wan West Station for unknown purposes. She hoped that the Police would pay attention to this for the sake of community safety.

10. The Hon TIEN Puk-sun, Michael said the crime figures demonstrated that officers in Tsuen Wan Police District had made praiseworthy efforts over the previous few years. To his mind, the officers were active and serious in their work. He hoped that the Police would pay attention to the problem of illegal parking in Discovery Park. He pointed out that roads in Tsuen Wan District were narrow and if vehicles were illegally parked on roads with double yellow lines like Heung Che Street, other vehicles had no alternative but to use another lane, which would result in traffic congestion. Besides, he called for the Police's attention to the problem of illegal road racing on Castle Peak Road off Discovery Park, which was often seen after 11:00 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. He indicated that street cleanliness was restored after the removal of skips that had been inconveniently placed at streets and occupied parking spaces earlier. He believed that the Police had made a great deal of efforts in this regard. He added that some lawbreakers had stolen the letters of residents in Tsuen King Garden in January this year. As the letters contained the personal data of residents, he worried that those persons might sell the personal data so collected for profits. He, therefore, hoped that the Police would strengthen publicity and education in this regard and communicate with security guards in different housing estates.

11. Mr NG Hin-lung, Norris thanked the Police for its efforts in keeping the serious crime figures for the Tsuen Wan Rural constituency at low levels. Yet, he called for the Police's attention to burglary in the constituency, which occasionally happened at Hong Kong Garden and Sea Crest Villa in particular. According to the information provided by the Police, most of these burglary cases involved illegal immigrants who sneaked into the housing estates from hills. He hoped that the Police would enhance communication with the property management companies of housing estates, reminding them to step up precautions. In addition, he indicated that the rampant illegal parking at Lido Garden and the Ma Wan pier caused serious congestion during holidays in particular, with some vehicles even parked on slow lanes. Yellow hatched markings were painted on the ground of the parking areas there and traffic signs bearing the wording "Waiting at yellow hatched marking area will be prosecuted without warning" were also erected. Despite these, patrol cars passing there did not take enforcement actions. In view of this, he hoped that the Police would explore long-term solutions with Members and step up enforcement.

12. Mr CHENG Chit-pun said that his constituency had a lower crime rate than other constituencies, but illegal parking on Castle Peak Road was an acute problem. He explained that as the bus stops outside Sham Tseng Village were crowded with parked vehicles during holidays, buses and minibuses could not pull in at the stops and were forced to pick up/drop off passengers on outer lanes, which indeed posed danger. He added that some residents had reported to the Police for assistance and the Police had taken enforcement actions, but subsequently, vehicles were illegally parked there again. He therefore hoped that the Police would consider how to take effective enforcement actions. Furthermore, he said that vehicles often ran at high speeds along Castle Peak Road through Tsing Lung Tau, Sham Tseng and Belvedere Garden in the evening, causing danger and making tremendous noise. In this connection, he hoped that the Police would step up enforcement by, for example, conducting roadblock operations.

13. Ms LAM Yuen-pun, Phyllis gave her regards to the police officers who had worked in cold weather over the previous few days to cordon off roads towards Tai Mo Shan and stop the public from doing dangerous acts. She indicated that the problem of illegal car racing persisted on Route Twisk, and hoped that the Police would step up enforcement in the current TWDC term by, for example, installing cameras to combat such racing. Besides, she said that the rampant illegal parking outside Hong Kong Adventist Hospital - Tsuen Wan resulted in traffic obstruction. As different persons drove to the hospital each day, she believed that the problem could hardly be eradicated even if the Police issued penalty tickets to the offenders of illegal parking. On the contrary, during the District Councils election period, the Police had strengthened patrol there and effectively curbed the offences involving illegal parking, vandalisation of banners and so forth. As the Police had not patrolled Tsuen King Circuit for a long time, she hoped that the Police would deploy manpower to step up patrol there, so as to make residents feel safer.

14. Mr TAM Hoi-pong indicated that traffic accidents happened frequently and even at mid-night at the junction of Pak Lam Road and Pak Lai Road outside Tower 17 of Park Island, Ma Wan. In view of this, he enquired whether the Police would work with the Transport Department to review the speeding problem in Ma Wan and the speed limit for vehicles on Ma Wan Island. Moreover, he enquired about the strength of police officers stationed in Ma Wan and whether there was any plan to increase police manpower there.

15. The Chairman reminded Members that the crime situation of Ma Wan would be discussed under the next agenda item.

16. Mr CHAN Chun-chung, Jones praised the Police for working diligently in very cold weather and offering assistance to a number of people trapped in Tai Mo Shan over the previous two days. He said that although the crime rates of Tsuen Wan Police District were kept at low levels, it was necessary to take appropriate winter precautions as the LNY was approaching. He also hoped that the Police would step up patrol to make the public feel safe.

17. The Vice Chairman indicated that a lay-by on Castle Peak Road near Belvedere Garden was often occupied by illegally parked vehicles. In recent years, vehicles were even parked there until the next morning, causing severe traffic congestion. He therefore hoped that the Police would step up enforcement by, for example, taking more frequent enforcement actions, and increase in the accumulated penalties paid by the offenders to achieve the deterrent effect. He further said it was dangerous that some road users did not observe road markings when using a zebra crossing on Castle Peak Road near a bus stop near Belvedere Garden. He would continue to follow up on this matter with officers of the Police Community Relations Office of Tsuen Wan Police District. Furthermore, he mentioned that many people had gone up Tai Mo Shan amid very cold weather in recent days, putting themselves at great risk; however, the dedicated HKPF and FSD officers had managed to perform their tasks in an extremely cold and tough environment. He gave recognition to the Police in this connection.

18. District Commander (Tsuen Wan) of the HKPF responded as follows:

- (1) the HKPF would follow up on Members' concerns one by one;
- (2) officers of Tsuen Wan Police District would join hands with officers of the Traffic Unit to take actions against illegal car racing and illegal parking in the district. The HKPF would consider taking other measures along with enforcement actions in order to improve the situation;
- (3) the street gambling problem in Lei Muk Shue Estate would be followed up by not only officers of the HKPF Special Duties Squads but also those of the Crime Unit of Tsuen Wan Police District;
- (4) in light of the burglary cases in Hong Kong Garden and Sea Crest Villa, the HKPF had established a channel for direct communication with the property management companies of the housing estates;
- (5) in view of the serious potential consequences of letter theft, the HKPF would give appropriate advice to property management companies. For example, they should report to the Police immediately for assistance if residents' letters were found to have been stolen. The Police would take follow-up actions accordingly; and
- (6) Ma Wan was under the charge of Kwai Tsing Police District as the demarcation of area under Police districts was different from that under District Council. He therefore would convey Members' concerns about traffic blackspots and police manpower in Ma Wan to District Commander (Kwai Tsing) for follow-up and response by officers of Kwai Tsing Police District.

19. The Chairman would like District Commander (Tsuen Wan) of the HKPF to instruct subordinate officers to contact the relevant Members after the meeting to follow up on the matters of their concern.

20. The Hon TIEN Puk-sun, Michael said he had suggested at a number of meetings of the Legislative Council that the Police should bring the problem of inadequate police manpower to the attention of senior government officials and use technologies to support its enforcement, as there would be more and more areas requiring the Police's support in enforcement, such as curbing "black cabs", "snaking" operations on Uber vehicles and electronic road pricing. He pointed out that given its inadequate police manpower, the Singaporean government had installed closed circuit televisions countrywide in a bid to curb illegal parking. He suggested Hong Kong follow Singapore in installing closed circuit televisions in various districts, so as to make prosecutions against offenders based on video records.

21. District Commander (Tsuen Wan) of the HKPF responded that he would relay Members' views to the traffic policy research division at the Police headquarters. To enhance efficiency in prosecution against illegal parking, the Police headquarters would also introduce improvement measures with technological support in the near future.

22. The Chairman asked the Transport Department and the HKPF to consider, by reference to the existing anti-speeding measures, installation of video cameras for technology-supported enforcement against illegal parking and illegal road racing. In addition, he asked the Police to step up efforts in combating illegal gambling in Lei Muk Shue Estate during the LNY period.

V Item 4: Crime Brief for Ma Wan - October to December 2015  
(TWDC Paper No. 10/2016)

23. District Commander (Tsuen Wan) of the HKPF reported on the situation of crime in Ma Wan.

24. Mr CHAN Sung-ip thanked officers of Kwai Tsing Police District for their efforts in reducing crimes in Ma Wan. He said that the security duties of Park Island fell on a property management company, whereas Tsing Yi Police Station assigned patrol cars and policemen to patrol Ma Wan Village on a daily basis. To guard against burglary, policemen also patrolled secluded locations, such as hillsides, in the village at irregular intervals and signed visiting books there.

VI Item 5: Programme Plan on Recreation and Sports Activities in Tsuen Wan District in March 2016 and 2016-17 by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department  
(TWDC Paper No. 11/2016)

25. The Chairman said that the Tsuen Wan District Leisure Services Office of the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) had submitted the programme plan on recreation and sports activities in Tsuen Wan District in March 2016 and 2016-17 for Members' consideration and endorsement of the funding applications concerned.

26. District Leisure Manager (Tsuen Wan) of the LCSD introduced the paper.

27. Members unanimously agreed to the programme plan on recreation and sports activities Tsuen Wan district in March 2016 and 2016-17 by the LCSD, and endorsed three funding applications of \$217,100 for the activities to be organised in March 2016, \$2,155,000 for the activities to be organised from April to September 2016, and

\$2,005,000 for activities to be organised from October 2016 to March 2017, of which \$146,500, would be payable in the financial year 2017/18.

VII Item 6: Annual Plan on District Free Entertainment Programmes in Tsuen Wan District in 2016/17 organised by the LCSD  
(TWDC Paper No. 12/2016)

28. The Chairman said that the Cultural Services Office (New Territories South) of the LCSD had submitted the plan on district free entertainment programmes in Tsuen Wan District in 2016/17 for Members' consideration and endorsement of the funding applications concerned. The LCSD representatives present at the meeting were Ms LEE Kit-ye, Kitty, Senior Manager (New Territories South) Promotion, and Miss NG Lai-fong, Agnes, Manager (New Territories South) Marketing & District Activities.

29. Senior Manager (New Territories South) Promotion of the LCSD introduced the paper.

30. Mr NG Hin-lung, Norris enquired whether the LCSD would review and modify the programmes from time to time in accordance with their popularity, so as to avoid over-emphasis on programmes which were not well received. Moreover, he hoped that the LCSD would be active in exploring more performance venues, so that the district free entertainment programmes could be participated by more residents in Tsuen Wan District.

31. Mr KOT Siu-yuen considered it necessary to enhance the publicity of the programmes by, for example, strengthening collaboration with Members in promotion. He was concerned about the cost-effectiveness of on-stage programmes, which had recorded a low participation rate in the last TWDC term.

32. Ms LAM, Lam Nixie indicated that at present, free entertainment programmes held in Tsuen Wan District were mainly promoted by means of posters and venues' event calendars mailed to Members. She hoped that the LCSD would explore other means of promotion and inform Members earlier about the contents of the programmes to facilitate their promotion to residents. She pointed out that Tsuen Wan District had a relatively aged population except for some newly-developed areas and its residents were more interested to participate in the entertainment and recreational activities organised by the Government, because their fees were relatively low and their quality was guaranteed.

33. Senior Manager (New Territories South) Promotion of the LCSD responded that the Department would explore how to enhance the publicity of the district free entertainment programmes in 2016/17 and actively fit the needs of the district. She said that Members were welcome to suggest new performance venues in their constituencies. The LCSD would assign its officers to conduct site visits with the Members of the constituencies concerned to study various aspects of the venues, such as the facilities, power supply, and transport support. Moreover, she indicated that Members were welcome to offer ideas on the programme contents for the Department's follow-up.

34. As a new committee on coastal affairs had been set up under the TWDC of the current term, Ms LAM, Lam Nixie suggested the LCSD to consider identifying suitable locations in the coastal areas for organising entertainment activities and bring them up for discussion with Members.

35. The Chairman asked the LCSD to enhance communication with Members and asked Members to offer views on the district free entertainment programmes at future meetings of the District Facilities Management Committee.

36. The Vice Chairman believed that there was still room for discussion on the venues of the more than 30 district free entertainment programmes to be held in 2016/17. Therefore, Members might recommend possible activity venues to the LCSD directly.

37. Members unanimously agreed to the plan on district free entertainment programmes in 2016/17 and endorsed two funding applications of \$66,000 for March 2016 and \$603,600 for April 2016 to March 2017, of which \$68,000, would be payable in the financial year 2017/18.

VIII Programme Plan on the Extension Activities of the Public Libraries in Tsuen Wan District from April 2016 to March 2017 by the LCSD  
(TWDC Paper No. 13/2016)

38. The Chairman said that the LCSD had submitted the programme plan on the extension activities to be held by public libraries in Tsuen Wan District in 2016/17 for Members' consideration and endorsement of the funding applications concerned. The LCSD representative present at the meeting was MsTSE Ka-yee, Carmen, Senior Librarian (Tsuen Wan).

39. Senior Librarian (Tsuen Wan) of the LCSD introduced the paper.

40. Members unanimously agreed to the programme plan on the extension activities in 2016/17 and endorsed two funding applications of \$1,855 for March 2016 and \$50,000 for April 2016 to March 2017, of which \$2,120, would be payable in the financial year 2017/18.

IX Item 8: Nomination of a Representative from the TWDC to Serve as the Member of the Kowloon Regional Advisory Committee of the Hospital Authority  
(TWDC Paper No. 14/2016)

41. The Secretary introduced the paper.

42. The Chairman thanked Ms LAM Yuen-pun, Phyllis for serving on the Kowloon Regional Advisory Committee of the Hospital Authority and offering many valuable ideas on the hospital services of the Kowloon region over the previous four years.

43. Members unanimously endorsed the nomination of Ms LAM, Lam Nixieas the TWDC's representative to the Kowloon Regional Advisory Committee of the Hospital Authority.

X Item 9: Nomination of a Representative from the TWDC to Serve as the Member of the Join the Customer Liaison Group of the Hongkong Post  
(TWDC Paper No. 15/2016)

44. The Secretary introduced the paper.

45. The Chairman thanked Mr CHAN Chun-chung, Jones for serving on the Join the Customer Liaison Group of the Hongkong Post and offering many valuable ideas on post services over the previous two years.

46. Members unanimously endorsed the re-nomination of Mr CHAN Chun-chung, Jones to continue to be the TWDC's representative to the Join the Customer Liaison Group of the Hongkong Post.

XI Item 10: Information Papers

47. Members noted the contents of the following information papers:

XII Item 11: Any Other Business

48. The Chairman said that the Government had implemented a pilot scheme in Sham Shui Po and Yuen Longs, providing the District Management Committees chaired by District Officers with the power to address certain management and environmental hygiene problems of public areas and with the District Councils' advice on the priorities. The said scheme was completed in August last year with satisfactory results. In the 2016 Policy Address, the Chief Executive suggested implementing the District-led Actions Scheme in all 18 districts to further take forward the concept of "addressing district issues at the local level and capitalising on local opportunities". He added that the scheme would be discussed at the next TWDC meeting and the Tsuen Wan District Office would discuss with various committees how to determine the work priorities of the Tsuen Wan District-led Actions Scheme.

49. The Chairman indicated that it was agreed at the first special meeting of the TWDC held on 18 January 2016 that the six original committees (i.e. the District Facilities Management Committee, the Cultural, Recreation and Sports Committee, the Environmental and Health Affairs Committee, the Community Building, Planning and Development Committee, the Social Services and Community Information Committee, and the Traffic and Transport Committee) be retained, and a new committee (i.e. the Coastal Affairs Committee) be created to follow up on matters concerning coastal and sea areas. Moreover, he said that at the meeting on that day, the Coastal Affairs Committee was empowered to examine and approve the District Council fund applications on community involvement activities relating to major developments in coastal areas. As section 5.1.1 of the Guidelines on the TWDC Funds set out the respective scopes of funding applications to be considered by the TWDC and its committees, it was necessary to amend the relevant clause. After the meeting, the Secretariat would, by circulation of papers, ask Members to consider whether to endorse the proposed amendments.

(Post-meeting note: The proposed amendments were endorsed on 2 February 2016 by circulation of papers.)

50. The Chairman said that the Community Sports Committee and the LCSD had sent a fax on 20 January 2016 inviting the TWDC to once again nominate two representatives from its Members to serve as "sports ambassadors" of the new term from January 2016 until the end of December 2017 to assist in promoting district sports. Following previous arrangements, he suggested passing the matter to the Culture, Recreation and Sports Committee for follow-up.

51. Members unanimously agreed that the matter concerning the nomination for “sports ambassadors” be passed to the Culture, Recreation and Sports Committee for follow-up.

52. The Chairman said that Yan Chai Hospital had written to the Secretariat, inviting the TWDC to act as a supporting organisation of the “Chinese New Year Poon Choi Feast for the Elderly”, which would be hosted by the hospital together with MTR Corporation Limited at noon on 28 February 2016 (Sunday) at Discovery Park. Some 600 elderly people in the district would be invited to this activity to enjoy “Poon Choi” for lunch for LNY celebration. The activity would also serve to express respect and concern for the elderly. Besides the homes run by organisations under Yan Chai Hospital, TWDC Members and the elderly in their constituencies would also be invited to join the activity.

53. Members unanimously agreed that the TWDC act as a supporting organisation of the said activity. The Chairman asked the Secretariat to assist in the relevant follow-up work.

54. The Chairman said that to enhance communication and partnership with District Council Members, the Chief Secretary for Administration invited Members to a briefing session on district administration, which would be held from 3:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. on 4 February 2016 at Conference Hall, 2/F, Central Government Offices. The Home Affairs Department had earlier written to all Members, inviting them to the briefing session. Members were encouraged to attend the briefing session.

55. The Chairman said that co-hosted by the Tsuen Wan District Office and the TWDC, the “Chinese New Year Celebration Lunch 2016 by Tsuen Wan District Office and Tsuen Wan District Council” would be held from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. on 16 February 2016 (the ninth day of the first month of the Lunar calendar) at Grand Ballroom, 5/F, Panda Hotel, Tsuen Wan. As the TWDC was one of the organisers of the activity, he hoped that all Members could attend the venue earlier for guest reception.

56. The Vice Chairman indicated that the Civil Engineering and Development Department had recently sent an email inviting Members to visit Stanley Sewage Treatment Works on 29 January 2016 for a better understanding of the operation of a cavern sewage works. Members were informed before this meeting that the visit had been re-scheduled for 28 January.

57. The Chairman said that the arrangements were too hasty, and suggested the Vice Chairman propose in the reply that the Civil Engineering and Development Department postpone the visit to after LNY.

58. The Chairman reminded Members that the next meeting would be held on 22 March 2016 and the deadline for paper submission was 7 March 2016.

59. The Chairman said that the LNY was approaching and he wished Members a successful, happy and healthy New Year.

60. There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 4:19 p.m.
