Action

I Opening Remarks and Introduction

The Chairman welcomed Members and representatives from government departments to the 11<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Tsuen Wan District Council (TWDC).

2. The Chairman reminded Members that according to sections 17(1) and 27 of the Tsuen Wan District Council Standing Orders (the Standing Orders), any Member who wished to move a motion or ask any question at a meeting of the Council was required to give the Secretary a notice in writing ten clear working days before the meeting. Thus, he reminded Members that the date of the next meeting was 23 November 2021 and the deadline for submission of papers was 8 November 2021. In view of the numerous items on the agenda, the Chairman reminded Members to speak as concisely as possible. In addition, according to section 28 of the Standing Orders, unless otherwise agreed by the Chairman, Members could only speak once for each agenda item at the meeting and each Member could speak up to 1.5 minutes. A maximum of five Members could speak on each agenda item. If more than five Members spoke on an agenda item, he would shorten the speaking time of each Member. The Member(s) who had submitted a paper would have 2 minutes to give an introduction and 1.5 minutes to draw a conclusion. The representatives of the departments would have up to 2 minutes to give a response.

II Item 1: Confirmation of Minutes of the 10<sup>th</sup> Meeting held on 20.7.2021

3. The Chairman said that the Secretariat did not receive any proposed amendment before the meeting. The minutes of the meeting were confirmed without amendment.

III Item 2: Matters Arising from the Minutes of the Previous Meetings

4. The Chairman said that there were no matters arising from the minutes of the previous meeting.

5. The Chairman said that agenda items 3 to 9 were all applications for District Council funds. Hence, after the Secretary's introduction to each paper, he would ask Members to make declarations of interest and then process all funding application(s) set out on each paper. Members were welcome to put forth views, if any, on an individual funding application for discussion. Members unanimously agreed to the arrangement.

IV Item 3: Application for District Council Funds by Tsuen Wan District Council  
(TWDC Paper No. 49/21-22)

6. The Secretary introduced the paper. She stated that Mr MAN Yu-ming was the Honorary Vice President of the Tsuen Wan Preparatory Committee of National Day Celebration (TWPCNDC), Member of the District Fight Crime Committee (Tsuen Wan District) (DFCC) and Honorary President of the Tsuen Wan Kwai Ching District Women's Association (TWKCDWA), and Mr YAU Kam-ping and Mr CHAN Sung-ip were the Honorary Vice Presidents of the TWPCNDC, so as to indicate that they had declared their memberships and honorary positions.

7. The Chairman requested that the Member who was concurrently the Member of the DFCC should remain silent during the discussion of the funding application concerned and should not participate in the decision-making or voting on the funding application concerned in accordance with section 48(11) of the Standing Orders. Besides, the Chairman decided that Members who had declared their honorary positions in the TWPCNDC and TWKCDWA could participate in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the funding applications concerned.

8. The Chairman asked if Members had to make declarations of other interests. No Member made a declaration of other interests.

9. Members unanimously endorsed the funding applications as follows:

She stated that Mr LAM Sek-tim, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr KOT Siu-yuen were Members of the Working Group on Public Health and Food Safety (WGPHFS), and Mr LAM Sek-tim, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr WONG Ka-wa were Members of the Working Group on Inclusive Environment for Animals in the Community (WGIEAC), so as to indicate that they had declared their memberships.

(Note: Mr KOT Siu-yuen joined the meeting at 2:38 p.m.)

15. The Chairman decided that the Members who were concurrently the Members of the WGPHFS and/or Members of the WGIEAC could participate in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the funding applications concerned in accordance with section 48(11) of the Standing Orders.

16. The Chairman asked if Members had to make declarations of other interests. No Member made a declaration of other interests.

17. Members unanimously endorsed the funding applications as follows:

VII Item 6: Application for District Council Funds by Recreation, Sports, Arts and Culture For All Committee  
(TWDC Paper No. 52/21-22)

18. The Secretary introduced the paper. She stated that the Vice Chairman, Mr LAM Sek-tim, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio, Mr WONG Ka-wa, Mr KOT Siu-yuen and Mr LAU Cheuk-yu were Members of the Strategy Group on Promotion of Recreational, Sports, Cultural and Arts Activities (SGPRSCAA) and Mr MAN Yu-ming was the Vice Chairman of the Tsuen Wan Sports Festival Co-ordinating Committee (TWSFCC), so as to indicate that they had declared their memberships of the SGPRSCAA or membership of the TWSFCC.

19. The Chairman asked if Members had to make declarations of other interests. Mr WONG Ka-wa declared his membership of the TWSFCC.

20. The Chairman decided that the Members who had declared their memberships of the TWSFCC could not participate in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the funding application concerned in accordance with section 48(11) of the Standing Orders. Besides, the Chairman decided that the Members who were concurrently the Members of the SGPRSCAA could also participate in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the funding application concerned.

21. The Chairman stated that the two funding applications of the paper would be handled separately, and that he had received some views on the first funding application from Members. The organiser applied for a funding amount of over \$230,000 to organise a training course on filming. The training course would have a capacity of 15 participants, for whom refreshments and drinks would be provided. He pointed out that the participants would not be charged for taking part in the training course. Also, as the epidemic was raging for the time being, it was inappropriate for them to take off masks to eat and exchange views with others. He thus suggested deleting the funding item of "Refreshments and Drinks for Participants". Besides, as the organiser applied for a considerable amount of funds, he proposed that allowances should be provided according to the actual number of participants in all items. Additionally, the organiser applied for a funding amount of \$168,000 under Funding Item 11 - "Filming Day" Engagement Fee for a Service Contractor. He suggested that the organiser should publicly and transparently invite quotations and provide relevant information for Members' perusal.

22. Mr YAU Kam-ping suggested that the co-organiser should brief Members on the activity concerned.

23. Mr CHAN Sung-ip said that past TWDC activities were mainly training courses and interest groups. The primary aim of engaging instructors was to raise the public's interest in relevant activities rather than training a handful of participants and providing them with opportunities of further studies. Thus, he did not agree to allocating a funding amount of \$230,000 to the provision of training for only 15 participants.

24. Mr KOT Siu-yuen said he did not support the funding application concerned. While agreeing that the activity was constructive, he cast doubt on the necessity of renting expensive equipment. He opined that with the wide adoption of smartphones nowadays, it was very common to film and produce videos using smartphones. As such, he had reservations about endorsing the funding application in the amount of \$230,000 for organising an activity with only 15 participants.

25. Mr WONG Ka-wa said that in Funding Item 11 - "Filming Day" Engagement Fee for a Service Contractor, the organiser applied for a funding amount of \$168,000 from the TWDC for 90-hour filming work. Past experience showed that the rental cost of sound equipment only accounted for a relatively small portion of the overall expenditure of major activities in the district. Hence, he advised the organiser to invite quotations and conduct a tendering exercise, with the TWDC acting as a gatekeeper abiding by the principle of "lowest bid wins" with a view to making optimal use of the funds.

26. The Chairman said that the activity concerned would be jointly organised by the organiser and the Recreation, Sports, Arts and Culture For All Committee (RSACFAC). As the amount under application exceeded the funding ceiling of \$220,000, the funding application should be submitted to the TWDC for vetting and approval. The rental of filming equipment was the major expense of the activity. Participants would receive training in filming with the aid of such equipment. Besides, the organiser would invite participants to film and produce videos for showing, and the estimated number of viewers was 7 500.

27. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the funding application. The voting result was 2 in favour, 3 against and 0 abstention. The following funding application was not endorsed:

29. The Chairman said that prior to this meeting, the Secretariat was notified by the Tsuen Wan Safe and Healthy Community Steering Committee of its withdrawal of its application for District Council funds to organise Road Safety Talk for the Elderly in Tsuen Wan. Therefore, the activity would be cancelled and would not be discussed.

30. The Secretary introduced the paper. She stated that Mr LAM Sek-tim, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr WONG Ka-wa were Members of the Working Group on Road Safety Education and Promotion (WGRSEP), so as to indicate that they had declared their memberships.

31. The Chairman decided that the Members who were concurrently Members of the WGRSEP could also participate in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the funding applications concerned in accordance with section 48(11) of the Standing Orders.

32. The Chairman asked if Members had to make declarations of other interests. No Member made a declaration of other interests.

33. Members unanimously endorsed the funding applications as follows:

IX Item 8: Application for District Council Funds by Social Service and Community Development Committee  
(TWDC Paper No. 54/21-22)

34. The Secretary introduced the paper. She stated that the Vice Chairman, Mr MAN Yu-ming, Mr LAM Sek-tim, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr WONG Ka-wa were Members of the Working Group on Integrated Community Services and Community Education (WGICSCE); the Vice Chairman, Mr LAM Sek-tim, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr WONG Ka-wa were Members of the Task Force on Care for the Elderly, Rehabilitation and Community Information (TFCERCI); and the Chairman, Vice Chairman, Mr MAN Yu-ming, Mr YAU Kam-ping, Mr LAM Sek-tim, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio, Mr WONG Ka-wa, Mr KOT Siu-yuen and Mr LAU Cheuk-yu were Members of the Working Group on the 60th Anniversary of the Founding of the Satellite Town of Tsuen Wan (WGAFSTTW), so as to indicate that they had declared their memberships.

35. The Chairman stated that he had declared his membership of the WGAFSTTW. As it was only a nominal post title, he could continue to chair the meeting and participate in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the funding applications concerned after his declaration of interest. Besides, he decided that Members who were concurrently Members of the WGICSCE, TFCERCI and/or WGAFSTTW could also participate in the discussion, decision-making and voting on the funding applications concerned in accordance with section 48(11) of the Standing Orders.

36. The Chairman asked if Members had to make declarations of other interests. No Member made a declaration of other interests.

37. Members unanimously endorsed the funding applications as follows:

X Item 9: Proposed New Items under District Minor Works  
(TWDC Paper No. 55/21-22)

38. The Chairman said that the Tsuen Wan District Office (TWDO) and Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) would like to brief Members on six proposed new items under district minor works in Tsuen Wan in 2021-22. The departments would like to solicit Members' support and hoped that Members would endorse the funding application concerned. The representatives from the departments attending the meeting were:

- (1) Mr LAI Yik-wing, Wesley, District Officer (Tsuen Wan) (Acting) (DO(TW)(Atg)), TWDO;
- (2) Mr CHAN Sai-hung, Senior Inspector of Works, TWDO; and
- (3) Ms LEE Mei-sheung, Dickie, District Leisure Manager (Tsuen Wan) (DLM(TW)), LCSD.

39. DO(TW)(Atg) of the TWDO and DLM(TW) of the LCSD briefed Members on six proposed new items under district minor works in Tsuen Wan in 2021-22.

40. Mr WONG Ka-wa said that regarding proposed new project item 1 – Extension of rain shelters near lamp post DC1209 and DC1211 at Tsuen Wan Market Street, he suggested replacing the traditional seating design with a foldable seating design by drawing reference from the practices of Wong Tai Sin district and Kowloon City district. Foldable seats would not only achieve the original goal of providing seats for people waiting for public transport, but would also take up less pavement space than their traditional counterparts. As for proposed new project item 3 – Improvement works for pavilions near Tsing Lung Tau, Pai Min Kok Village, Sham Tseng East Village and Ting Kau Village, Tsuen Wan, he suggested that consideration should be given to installing solar-powered lighting systems on the pavilions subject to the consent of the local communities concerned. With respect to proposed new project item 4 – Provision of benches near lamp post MW074N at Ma Wan Soccer Pitch and lamp post W2535 at Sai Lau Kok Road, Tsuen Wan, he proposed installing three benches at each of the two waiting areas aforementioned. Considering that the road distances between waiting areas around those locations were relatively long, he hoped that more benches would be set up where resources permit so as to provide additional seats for people waiting for public transport. As regards proposed new project item 6 – Improvement works at Sam Pei Square Playground, he recommended

providing lower seats at the playground with a view to preventing slips among elderly users of the facilities concerned.

41. DO(TW)(Atg) of the TWDO said that follow-up actions would be taken after the meeting.

42. DLM(TW) of the LCSD said that follow-up actions would be taken after the meeting.

(Note: Mr LAU Cheuk-yu joined the meeting at 2:58 p.m.)

43. Members unanimously endorsed the funding application in the amount of \$1,557,000 for the six proposed new items under district minor works in Tsuen Wan in 2021-22.

XI Item 10: Discussion on Matters Relating to the Streamlining of the Structure of Committees and Working Groups under the Tsuen Wan District Council

44. The Chairman suggested that to more effectively handle affairs of the TWDC, the structure of Committees and Working Groups under the TWDC should be streamlined, including consolidating the numbers of Committees and Working Groups and electing Convenors for the Working Groups with Convenor vacancies. In case of a failure to elect Convenors for those Working Groups at this meeting, the relevant matters could be followed up at meetings of the respective Committees in due course.

45. The Chairman stated that he would handle matters of consolidating the numbers of Committees and Working Groups first. He pointed out that although there were only ten incumbent Members left in the TWDC, there were as many as five Committees. As it was stipulated under section 33(2) of the Standing Orders that the total number of Committees under the Council should be four at the minimum, he enquired whether Members agreed to incorporating the terms of reference of the RSACFAC into those of the SSCDC.

46. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said that the District Planning, Development and Facilities Management Committee (DPDFMC) had already earmarked a large portion of funds for the item “Activities held by the Leisure and Cultural Services Department”. He thus enquired about the reasons for not merging the RSACFAC with the DPDFMC.

47. The Chairman said that the time needed for discussion for DPDFMC meetings was generally longer than those for SSCDC and RSACFAC meetings. Hence, incorporating the RSACFAC into the DPDFMC would significantly increase the workloads of Members of the DPDFMC and the Secretariat. He thus suggested merging the RSACFAC with the SSCDC, given their shorter meeting lengths and similarities in their nature.

48. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said he was the Acting Chairman of the RSACFAC. He enquired about the reasons for incorporating the RSACFAC into the SSCDC, but not the other way round.

49. Mr LAM Sek-tim suggested directly abolishing both the RSACFAC and SSCDC, and forming a new committee with a different name. A Chairman and Vice Chairman of the new committee should then be elected. Moreover, he enquired whether the committee formed as a result of the merger would be named the “Social Service and Community Development Committee”, without the words “Recreation, Sports, Arts and Culture”. He opined that if those words were not incorporated into the name of the new committee, it would give people an impression that the relevant work was neglected. He thus suggested renaming the committee.

50. Mr KOT Siu-yuen supported the merger. He pointed out that since the number of incumbent Members had decreased, and both the RSACFAC and SSCDC dealt with funding for cultural, recreational and social welfare items, he opined that the merger of the RSACFAC and SSCDC could enable more systematic handling of the work of the TWDC and its Committees.

51. Mr MAN Yu-ming supported merging the RSACFAC and SSCDC. The terms of reference and nature of service of both Committees were suitable for merging. Also, as the number of incumbent Members had decreased, he opined that the proposed merger could enable the TWDC to better concentrate on its publicity and educational work.

52. The Chairman said that the service nature and targets of the SSCDC were relatively diverse, whereas the service nature of the RSACFAC was fairly straightforward. Hence, it was more appropriate to incorporate the RSACFAC into the SSCDC. He pointed out that although the new committee resulting from the merger would bear the name “Social Service and Community Development Committee”, it would nevertheless embody the functions of the RSACFAC. If a brand new committee was to be formed, Members would have to start the discussion all over again, and convene another meeting on another date to endorse the relevant terms of reference, elect the Chairman and discuss the structure of the committee afresh. As such, he opined that merging the terms of reference of the RSACFAC and SSCDC was the most efficient and expeditious approach.

53. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said he would like to move a motion to incorporate the SSCDC into the RSACFAC. Mr LAM Sek-tim seconded.

54. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu proposed that an open ballot should be held. Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

55. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the proposal of incorporating the SSCDC into the RSACFAC. The voting result was as follows:

For (2 votes in total)

Mr LAM Sek-tim and Mr LAU Cheuk-yu

Against (3 votes in total)

Mr MAN Yu-ming, Mr YAU Kam-ping and Mr WONG Ka-wa

Abstention (1 vote in total)

Mr KOT Siu-yuen

56. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the proposal of incorporating the RSACFAC into the SSCDC. The voting result was listed as follows:

For (6 votes in total)

Mr MAN Yu-ming, Mr YAU Kam-ping, Mr CHAN Sung-ip, Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio, Mr WONG Ka-wa and Mr KOT Siu-yuen

Against (0 vote in total)

Abstention (0 vote in total)

57. The Chairman announced that the RSACFAC was hereby incorporated into the SSCDC, and enquired whether Members agreed to the terms of reference of the new committee. Members unanimously endorsed the terms of reference.

58. The Chairman said he would proceed to handle the proposed mergers of working groups and the election of Convenors for those working groups with Convenor vacancies.

59. Mr KOT Siu-yuen enquired whether, following the incorporation of the RSACFAC into the SSCDC, the membership lists of both Committees would also be merged and the Convenors of the working groups under the new committee would be elected at its meeting.

60. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said that he had been the Vice Chairman of the RSACFAC. He enquired whether he would automatically become the Vice Chairman of the SSCDC after the incorporation of the RSACFAC into the SSCDC.

61. The Chairman said that the RSACFAC had been incorporated into the SSCDC and the membership lists of both Committees had been merged. Hence, subject to the consent of Members, the Convenors of the working groups under the new committee could be elected directly at this TWDC meeting or at a meeting of the new committee separately. Besides, the office of Vice Chairman of the new committee was vacant for the time being, instead of being held by Mr LAU Cheuk-yu.

62. The Chairman enquired whether Members agreed to merging the WGICSCE and TFCERCI into a “Task Force on Integrated Community Services, Community Education, Care for the Elderly, Rehabilitation and Community Information” and the terms of reference of the new task force. Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

63. The Chairman said that Mr WONG Ka-wa was previously the Vice Convenor of the TFCERCI, and the offices of Convenor and Vice Convenor of the WGICSCE were vacant. He enquired if any Members wanted to nominate themselves or fellow Members for the office of Convenor of the “Task Force on Integrated Community Services, Community Education, Care for the Elderly, Rehabilitation and Community Information”.

64. Mr LI Hung-por nominated Mr WONG Ka-wa for the office of Convenor of the “Task Force on Integrated Community Services, Community Education, Care for the Elderly, Rehabilitation and Community Information”.

65. The Chairman asked whether Mr WONG Ka-wa accepted the nomination. Mr WONG Ka-wa said he accepted the nomination.

66. The Chairman announced that Mr WONG Ka-wa was now the Convenor of the “Task Force on Integrated Community Services, Community Education, Care for the Elderly, Rehabilitation and Community Information”.

67. Mr KOT Siu-yuen enquired whether the Vice Convenor of the new task force would be immediately elected.

68. Mr WONG Ka-wa said he did not mind immediately electing the Vice Convenor of the new task force at this meeting. However, to avoid protracting the meeting and having taken into account various factors, he suggested that a decision should be made at a meeting of the relevant Committee in due course.

69. The Chairman said that it depended on whether the Convenor needed a Vice Convenor. Given the current shortage of incumbent Members, not all working groups would have a Vice Convenor. Separately, he enquired whether Members agreed to merging the Audit Working Group on Activities under the RSACFAC and the Audit Group under the SSCDC into a new Audit Group and the terms of reference of the new Audit Group. Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

70. The Chairman nominated Mr LI Hung-por for the office of Convenor of the new Audit Group. He enquired if any Members wanted to make other nominations.

71. Mr KOT Siu-yuen nominated himself for the office of Convenor of the new Audit Group.

72. The Chairman asked Mr LI Hung-por whether he intended to run for the office of Convenor of the new Audit Group. Mr LI Hung-por said that he was willing to withdraw his candidacy for the office of Convenor of the new Audit Group.

73. The Chairman announced that Mr KOT Siu-yuen was now the Convenor of the Audit Group.

74. The Chairman enquired whether Members agreed to merging the Working Group on Community Halls and Recreation and Sports Facilities with the Working Group on District Development, Planning and Economic Development into a “Working Group on District Development, Planning, Economic Development, Community Halls and Recreation and Sports Facilities” and the terms of reference of the new working group. Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

75. The Chairman enquired if any Members wanted to nominate themselves or fellow Members for the office of Convenor of the new working group.

76. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr MAN Yu-ming nominated themselves for the office of Convenor of the new working group.

77. The Chairman enquired of Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr MAN Yu-ming whether they would withdraw their candidacies for the office of Convenor of the new working group. Both Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr MAN Yu-ming said that they would not withdraw their candidacies.

78. Mr WONG Ka-wa suggested that the two Members should serve as the Convenor and Vice Convenor of the new working group.

79. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu considered the suggestion unreasonable, as Members had just decided that candidacies for the office of Vice Convenor should be discussed later at meetings of the relevant Committees.

80. The Chairman said that if the two Members could take up the roles of Convenor and Vice Convenor of the new working group after some discussion, it would not be necessary to elect the Convenor and Vice Convenor of the new working group by ballot at this TWDC meeting.

81. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the nomination of Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio for the office of Convenor of the “Working Group on District Development, Planning, Economic Development, Community Halls and Recreation and Sports Facilities”. The voting result was 5 votes in favour.

82. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the nomination of Mr MAN Yu-ming for the office of Convenor of the “Working Group on District Development, Planning, Economic Development, Community Halls and Recreation and Sports Facilities”. The voting result was 3 votes in favour.

83. The Chairman announced that Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio was now the Convenor of the new working group.

84. The Chairman enquired whether Members agreed to merging the WGEPI with the WGP HFS into a “Working Group on Environmental Protection, Improvement, Public Health and Food Safety” and the terms of reference of the new working group. Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

85. The Chairman enquired if any Members wanted to nominate themselves or fellow Members for the office of Convenor of the new working group.

86. Mr KOT Siu-yuen nominated Mr MAN Yu-ming for the office of Convenor of the new working group.

87. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu nominated Mr LAM Sek-tim for the office of Convenor of the new working group.

88. The Chairman enquired of Mr MAN Yu-ming and Mr LAM Sek-tim whether they accepted the nominations. Both Mr MAN Yu-ming and Mr LAM Sek-tim accepted the nominations.

89. Mr KOT Siu-yuen suggested that Mr MAN Yu-ming should make a self-nomination instead, and nominated Mr LAU Cheuk-yu for the office of Convenor of the new working group. Mr MAN Yu-ming then nominated himself for the office of Convenor of the new working group. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu did not accept the nomination.

90. Mr KOT Siu-yuen nominated Mr WONG Ka-wa for the office of Convenor of the new working group. Mr WONG Ka-wa did not accept the nomination.

91. Mr KOT Siu-yuen nominated Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio for the office of Convenor of the new working group. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio did not accept the nomination.

92. Mr KOT Siu-yuen nominated Mr LI Hung-por for the office of Convenor of the new working group. Mr LI Hung-por did not accept the nomination.

93. Mr KOT Siu-yuen nominated the Chairman for the office of Convenor of the new working group. The Chairman did not accept the nomination.

94. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the nomination of Mr MAN Yu-ming for the office of Convenor of the “Working Group on Environmental Protection, Improvement, Public Health and Food Safety”. The voting result was 4 votes in favour.

95. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the nomination of Mr LAM Sek-tim for the office of Convenor of the “Working Group on Environmental Protection, Improvement, Public Health and Food Safety”. The voting result was 5 votes in favour.

96. The Chairman announced that Mr LAM Sek-tim was now the Convenor of the new working group.

97. The Chairman said he would proceed to handle the Convenor vacancy of the WGIEAC.

98. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said that given the present shortage of incumbent Members and the fact that only one meeting of the WGIEAC had been convened so far, he proposed abolishing the WGIEAC and discussing animal issues in the community at meetings of the relevant Committee.

99. Mr WONG Ka-wa enquired whether the funding applications made to the WGIEAC would be referred to the relevant Committee for handling at its meetings or be cancelled in case the WGIEAC was abolished. In view of the small number of incumbent Members at present, he was worried that excessive meetings of Working Groups and Committees would increase the workloads of Members and the

Secretariat. Hence, he suggested that animal affairs in the community should be discussed at meetings of the relevant Committee.

100. The Chairman stated that the funding applications concerned would be referred to the relevant Committee for handling. He pointed out that the original objective of setting up the WGIEAC was to enable the public to learn about the TWDC's concern over animal affairs in the community. In his opinion, the TWDC should continue to pay attention to such affairs. Apart from providing funds, it should arrange for a working group to take follow-up action.

101. The Chairman enquired whether Members agreed to abolishing the WGIEAC and discussing animal affairs in the community at meetings of the relevant Committee. Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

102. The Chairman enquired whether Members agreed to merging the Working Group on Development of Public Transport Services and Working Group on Development of Ancillary Facilities for Pedestrians (WGDAFP) into a "Working Group on Development of Ancillary Facilities for Pedestrians and Public Transport Services" and the terms of reference of the new working group.

103. Mr CHAN Sung-ip enquired whether the name "Traffic and Transport Committee" (T&TC) would remain in use.

104. The Chairman stated that the name of the T&TC would remain unchanged, and two of the Working Groups under the T&TC were to be merged.

105. Members unanimously agreed to the proposed merger of the Working Groups aforementioned as well as the terms of reference of the new working group.

106. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu enquired whether the method of naming the new working group should be the same as that of naming the new committee formed after the merger of the RSACFAC and SSCDC. In his opinion, this would make a more reasonable approach.

107. The Chairman stated that the merger of two working groups differed from the merger of two committees. Given that Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr LAU Cheuk-yu were currently the Convenor and Vice Convenor of the WGDAFP respectively, he enquired whether Members agreed that Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio and Mr LAU Cheuk-yu should respectively take up the roles of Convenor and Vice Convenor of the "Working Group on Development of Ancillary Facilities for Pedestrians and Public Transport Services". Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

108. Mr KOT Siu-yuen was aware of the Chair and Vice Chair vacancies of the T&TC and Environment, Health and Climate Change Committee. Hence, he enquired whether it was appropriate to elect the Convenors and Vice Convenors of the Working Groups under the two Committees when those vacancies had yet to be filled.

109. Executive Officer I (District Council) (EOI(DC)) of the TWDO stated that the method for electing Convenors of working groups was not stipulated in the Standing Orders. Hence, Members could elect Convenors of working groups at a meeting of the TWDC. Besides, according to Appendix V of the Standing Orders, Members should make nominations by submitting nomination papers before the election of Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of Committees. If Convenors of the Working Groups could be elected first at this meeting, meetings of the Working Groups could be convened before the next meetings of the respective Committees. In that way, the relevant funding applications could first be discussed at meetings of the Working Groups and subsequently handled at meetings of the Committees.

110. The Chairman said that electing Convenors for working groups at this meeting could enhance the efficiency of operation. The Committees under the TWDC would arrange for by-elections of their Chair and Vice Chair vacancies in due course, and Members would be notified accordingly.

XII Item 11: Request for Additional Facilities and Support for Bus Fare Concessions

(TWDC Paper No. 56/21-22)

111. The Chairman stated that Mr WONG Ka-wa submitted the paper. The representative from the department responsible for giving response was Ms LUI Hiu-fai, Monica, Chief Transport Officer/NT South West (CTO/NTSW), Transport Department (TD). Besides, the written reply of the TD was tabled at the meeting.

112. Mr WONG Ka-wa introduced the paper.

113. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio said that during a bus journey on Route No. 52X, he noticed that after paying the full bus fare when boarding at the terminus at Tuen Mun Town Centre, it was possible to tap his Octopus Card on a card reader at the Hong Kong Gold Coast stop en-route after alighting at that stop. This had enabled him to enjoy a sectional fare concession by having his Octopus Card automatically credited with a certain amount of the bus fare paid. There was an eye-catching poster at the Hong Kong Gold Coast stop to facilitate passengers' identification of the location of the card reader. He opined that similar Octopus card readers for sectional bus fare concessions could be provided at more locations in Tsuen Wan district so as to provide residents with sectional fare concessions. Publicity efforts on such concessions could also be made to give residents a deeper understanding of the relevant sectional fare schemes.

114. CTO/NTSW of the TD responded as follows:

- (1) the TD had been encouraging the franchised bus companies and public transport service operators to offer passengers appropriate fare concessions where financially possible to alleviate the public's expenses on fares. When vetting proposals for fare concessions from franchised bus companies, the TD's considerations would be its commitment to maintaining multi-modal transport services across the districts and a coordinated and highly efficient public transport network, with due weight also given to the sound and sustainable development of operationally and financially viable transport services;

- (2) applications the TD received from the franchised bus companies for the provision of fare concessions for passengers included applications for the installation of new card readers not only near bus stops, but also within the premises of tertiary institutions. The sectional fare scheme for bus stops along Castle Peak Road mentioned by the Member was actually a trial scheme. The franchised company concerned would review the operation and effectiveness of the scheme before making further arrangements. In case further applications were received from franchised bus companies in respect of the provision of fare concessions, the TD would also vet the applications according to the aforesaid considerations. As regards Members' proposal for relocating a bus stop outside a garage's entrance near the swimming pool at Wo Yi Hop Road, the TD's engineers reckoned that safety would be the major concern in bus stop relocation. The engineers would liaise with Members to arrange a site inspection to give Members more insights into relevant safety concerns that should be considered when relocating the bus stop; and
- (3) the TD learnt that the franchised bus companies would continue to take forward their installation works for shelters, seats and arrival information display panels at bus stops. In particular, a bus stop shelter would be constructed at the Ho Fung College stop within this year for the convenience of residents in the district.

115. The Chairman showed his support for the suggestion on the provision of additional ancillary facilities for bus fare concessions. He also encouraged bus companies to shoulder their social responsibility by installing additional card readers and extending the scopes of their sectional fare schemes so as to provide the public with added convenience and reduce their expenses on fares.

XIII Item 12: Request for Re-surfacing of Decayed Road Surfaces at Both Sides of the Carriageways of Chuen Lung Street, San Tsuen Street and Ho Pui Street

(TWDC Paper No. 57/21-22)

116. The Chairman stated that Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio submitted the paper. The representatives from the departments responsible for giving response were:

- (1) Ms LUI Hiu-fai, Monica, CTO/NTSW, TD;
- (2) Mr WONG Lap-yan, Ivan, District Environmental Hygiene Superintendent (Tsuen Wan) (DEHS(TW)), Food and Environmental Hygiene Department (FEHD);
- (3) Mr YUEN Chiu-kit, Senior Health Inspector (Cleansing & Pest Control) Tsuen Wan 2, FEHD;
- (4) Mr LEE Wing-chuen, Senior Health Inspector (Hawker) Tsuen Wan, FEHD;
- (5) Mr Kerry Paul Lee CAREW, District Commander (Tsuen Wan) (DC(TW)), Hong Kong Police Force (HKPF); and
- (6) Ms HUNG Yuen-ching, Administrative Assistant/Lands (District Lands Office, Tsuen Wan and Kwai Tsing) (AA/Lands(DLO)), Lands Department (LandsD).

Besides, the written replies of the LandsD, Highways Department (HyD) and TD were tabled at the meeting.

117. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio introduced the paper.

118. Mr WONG Ka-wa said that there were quite a number of damaged road surfaces in Tsuen Wan district. He hoped that the HyD and TD would proactively take follow-up actions, send staff to conduct inspections in a timely manner, and draw up a timetable for handling decayed road surfaces (including the relatively serious case at the market near Chuen Lung Street) with a view to minimising the risk posed by uneven road surfaces to pedestrians, particularly the elderly.

119. Mr LAM Sek-tim said that at the joint meeting on street management in old areas in Tsuen Wan earlier, there had been a discussion on the causes of road surface decay, and they included heavy road traffic and persistent placement of goods on roads. Also, the accumulation of rainwater had led to uneven road surfaces, and the situation was the worst around Chuen Lung Street. He pointed out that the uneven road surface of the section of Ho Pui Street near Chung On Street had undergone multiple repairs; however, due to frequent vehicular movements, the road surface was damaged again upon repair. As such, he held that the Government should accord priority to enhancing street management, clearing goods placed on carriageways and solving the problem of unauthorised raised platforms. Only by doing so could it facilitate the departments' commencement of repair works for road surfaces to safeguard the lives and safety of the public. Besides, he opined that another joint meeting on street management in old areas in Tsuen Wan could be convened to discuss associated problems of street management so as to facilitate the prompt implementation of road re-surfacing works.

120. Mr KOT Siu-yuen supported road re-surfacing works. He pointed out that uneven road surfaces could also be found on the sections of Chuen Lung Street near Hoi Pa Street and Tsuen Wan Market Street. If the Government commenced road re-surfacing works, he hoped that the departments would take follow-up actions in tandem. He said that since bulky goods were always being piled up on pavements and platforms took up most of the pavement surfaces, pedestrians were forced to walk on carriageways and had to face a greater risk of trips and falls. Besides, gaps between platforms on the pavement and metal plates would become rodent hideouts, resulting in environmental hygiene problems on streets. He opined that the departments should more proactively conduct joint operations around Chuen Lung Street and clear obstructions placed on roads so as to improve the environmental hygiene and avoid obstructing the passage of pedestrians.

121. CTO/NTSW of the TD responded as follows:

- (1) after learning about Members' concern over the road surfaces of the carriageways of Chuen Lung Street, San Tsuen Street and Ho Pui Street, the TD had arranged for its engineers to contact the HyD. As stated in the HyD's written reply, after discovering potholes and damaged parts at both sides of the carriageways of those streets, the HyD had immediately deployed staff to carry out emergency repair and filling works at the relevant locations; and
- (2) the HyD was considering constructing flat drainage channels out of concrete at appropriate locations as a long-term measure to increase the

strength of the outfalls. Where necessary, the HyD would liaise with relevant departments to coordinate the planning of the construction works and the removal of obstructions for prompt implementation of the works.

122. DEHS(TW) of the FEHD responded that the FEHD had all along been concerned about the problems of environmental hygiene and shop front extensions of the relevant streets. It would make an all-out effort to handle goods placed on the pavement causing obstruction, and would dovetail its efforts with the road repair works carried out by various departments.

123. DC(TW) of the HKPF responded as follows:

- (1) article obstruction caused by shops' placement of goods on streets was a long standing problem. Over the years, the Police had spared no effort in enhancing street management by conducting many joint operations with the FEHD in the district. Also, the Police had all along been taking stringent traffic enforcement actions on the streets to tackle the above problems. It would continue to support the FEHD in the latter's law enforcement against illegal shop front extensions and street obstructions; and
- (2) if the departments had to carry out road repair or re-surfacing works, they could liaise with the Police, which would certainly provide assistance.

124. AA/Lands(DLO) of the LandsD responded as follows:

- (1) as the re-surfacing of decayed road surfaces at both sides of the carriageway was outside the purview of the LandsD, it did not have any comments; and
- (2) the problem of unauthorised raised platforms of concern to Members was a street management issue. The LandsD would, as usual, participate in the joint operations coordinated by the TWDO, and would join hands with such departments as the FEHD, HyD and HKPF to tackle the problem of shop front extensions through public education and publicity, complemented by inter-departmental enforcement actions at the black spots in the district.

125. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio regretted that the HyD had failed to send its representatives to attend the meeting. In his opinion, the road repair works could be commenced and taken forward more effectively only with the removal of goods and miscellaneous articles suspected to have been piled up on the road for a long time by nearby shops. He suggested that the works should be implemented in stages and by sessions to avoid causing inconvenience to the public and shops during the works period. Upon the completion of the road repair works, the HKPF and FEHD should step up enforcement action to improve street management. Also, it was necessary to ensure inter-departmental coordination so as to prevent goods from being piled up again and hence persistently covering puddles of stagnant water, which could damage road surfaces. He opined that if re-surfacing works were to be carried out near Chuen Lung Street, the FEHD could consider inviting the HyD to send its representatives to attend the meetings of the Market Management Consultative

Committee of Yeung Uk Road Market with a view to strengthening coordination with the market tenants and facilitating the implementation of the works. He considered that the HyD or TD should formulate a schedule for the re-surfacing works and submit it to the TWDC.

126. The Chairman regretted that the HyD had failed to send its representatives to attend the meeting, and hoped that it would provide a written reply to the Members' enquiries after the meeting. He pointed out that Members had all along been actively participating in work relating to tackling the problems of shop front extensions and damaged road surfaces, and hoped that they would continue to liaise with the FEHD, HKPF and relevant departments to follow up the problems. In his opinion, the FEHD and HKPF should step up the clearance of obstructions on the road at targeted black spots of article obstruction to create an enabling environment for the implementation of works. The HyD or TD should formulate a schedule for the re-surfacing works, and should coordinate with each other. The works schedule should be submitted within three months for the purpose of implementing the plan to take forward the works.

(Post-meeting note: The Secretariat conveyed Members' views to the TD and HyD in writing on 4 November 2021.)

XIV Item 13: Crime Brief for Tsuen Wan District – Comparison of Crime Statistics between June to July 2021 and June to July 2020  
(TWDC Paper No. 58/21-22)

127. DC(TW) of the HKPF reported on the crime situation of Tsuen Wan district.

128. Mr WONG Ka-wa considered the involvement of youths in drug-related crimes rather serious. On the other hand, he commended the Police's active follow-up on illicit cigarettes in the district and its operation at Lei Muk Shue which concluded with the arrest of two suspects and seizure of a certain quantity of illicit cigarettes. He also expressed his concern about illegal gambling at public housing estates, and suggested that the HKPF should continue to take enforcement action at Lei Muk Shue to tackle the problem of illegal gambling there. Separately, he opined that illegal parking at certain locations on Yeung Uk Road and Wo Tik Street had been significantly alleviated after the road markings at those locations had been changed to double white lines. He suggested that the TD and related departments should continue to follow up on the situation at the said locations so as to alleviate the problem of illegal parking at double yellow lines.

129. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said that the low utilisation rate of the Tsuen Wan District Junior Police Call Club House had long been criticised. Considering the convenient location of the Club House, and noting that murals had been painted on the external walls of the Club House and associated maintenance works had commenced, he suggested that the HKPF should put forth a proposal for increasing the utilisation rate of the Club House. Incidentally, he thanked the HKPF and TWDO for their recent operation against illegally abandoned vehicles, during which several motorcycles abandoned for years had finally been towed away.

130. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio expressed his concern about traffic congestion caused by illegal parking. He pointed out that in order to save money, motorists would not make good use of the parking spaces and loading/unloading bays at EW International Tower, but would rather park their vehicles illegally at the roadside on backstreets. This had caused serious traffic congestion around the junction where Yeung Uk Road westbound turned left into Wang Lung Street and Ma Kok Street. Thus, he suggested that the Police should enhance its enforcement action at that location. He also pointed out that the inadequacy of parking spaces at Tsuen Wan Industrial Centre and double parking on nearby roads were causing daytime traffic congestion every day, and posing difficulties to buses attempting to pick up and set down passengers. It was a rather poor situation. Since the problems had persisted even with the help of the security guards of Tsuen Wan Industrial Centre, he suggested that the Police should provide assistance. As illegal parking was frequent at the slow lane on the section of Yeung Uk Road beside The Aurora and Citywalk 2, he suggested that the Police should step up its enforcement action there. In addition, he said that new traffic control measures had recently been implemented at the junction where Yeung Uk Road eastbound turned left into Wo Tik Street. Upon the implementation, the lines separating the lanes there had been changed into solid-cum-broken lines and double white lines. Despite the change, illegal parking persisted, and some motorists even drove dangerously by cutting across lanes when turning into Wo Tik Street. He therefore suggested that the Police should enhance its enforcement action and join hands with the TD for a site inspection to examine the effectiveness of the new measures and find out if there was any room for improvement.

131. Mr LAM Sek-tim said that residents of Sheung Chui Court had complained to him about peddlers of illicit cigarettes who distributed promotional flyers and sold illicit cigarettes within the premises of the housing estate. He suggested that the HKPF should assist in following up on the matter. Besides, he opined that there were many cases of rape and indecent assault in Tsuen Wan district, and enquired about the progress in investigating various types of cases, including vice offences involving youths. He also suggested that the Police should increase its frequency of patrols to ensure the safety of the local community. He noted the arrests made by the HKPF against illegal gambling activities, but opined that only continuous enhancement of enforcement action at black spots of illegal gambling could effectively combat related crimes. For example, officers should be sent to Shek Pik Resettlers' Playground, Tsuen Wan to combat the relatively serious illegal gambling activities there. Additionally, he expressed concern about robberies in the district. As the "three-nil" buildings in the district were mostly not fitted with a main gate, pedestrians could freely access those buildings and criminals could easily enter those buildings to commit robberies at night when lighting was poor. The interconnections between the rooftops of many buildings in the old areas further facilitated criminals' access to different buildings. Hence, he suggested that the HKPF should pay attention to the security issues of rooftops of buildings.

132. The Chairman thanked the HKPF for actively listening and responding to Members' views all along. He was concerned about the problems of drug abuse and drug trafficking among youths. As drug trafficking was a serious offence, and a person would be liable to imprisonment for many years upon conviction, he suggested

that the Police should redouble its efforts in preventing drug abuse and drug trafficking among youths. Although the Police had successfully arrested a number of illegal gamblers in Lei Muk Shue, the problem of street gambling remained severe in the district. Thus, he hoped that the Police would continue to make manpower arrangements and deploy plain-clothes police officers to combat gambling activities in various areas in Tsuen Wan. Besides, he pointed out that a large number of damaged motorcycles had been abandoned on the streets and at metered parking spaces in the district. He thus suggested that the Police should coordinate its work with that of relevant departments and conduct joint operations to prevent traffic obstruction and occupation of parking spaces by these abandoned vehicles.

133. DC(TW) of the HKPF responded as follows:

- (1) the Police was gravely concerned about the problems of drug abuse and drug trafficking among youths. If criminals were believed to be exploiting children and youths to carry out such criminal activities, the Police would assign investigation teams consisting of senior officers to follow up the cases and trace them. The Police would consider applying to the Department of Justice for heavier penalties on criminals committing such crimes;
- (2) as the Tsuen Wan District Junior Police Call Club House was damaged during the social incidents that occurred over a year ago, it had to be closed for maintenance. Since the completion of repair work and the reopening of the Club House, its utilisation rate had been gradually increasing;
- (3) the Police had all along attached importance to the traffic black spots and illegal parking on Yeung Uk Road and Texaco Road. From June to July 2021, the Police issued 652 and 212 fixed penalty tickets (FPTs) at Yeung Uk Road and Texaco Road respectively, and towed away two private cars which had caused serious road obstruction on Yeung Uk Road;
- (4) traffic congestion on Wang Lung Street was very serious from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. every day. The illegal parking of vehicles and loading/unloading activities along Wang Lung Street and Fui Yiu Kok Street had further aggravated the congestion problem. From June to July 2021, the Police issued 193 FPTs at Wang Lung Street. It would continue to take stringent traffic enforcement actions in the industrial area thereat;
- (5) as far as he knew, motorcycles in respect of which the licences had expired were illegally parked at such black spots as the vicinity of the minibus stop off Lei Shu Road and the area outside Shield Industrial Centre at Hoi Tak Street. To combat the problem of prolonged occupation of parking spaces by abandoned motorcycles, the Police conducted a joint operation with the TWDO and HyD on 1 September 2021 in the vicinity of Wing Shun Street near Riviera Gardens and the vicinity of Wing Tak Street near Block 8 of City Point, during which six abandoned motorcycles were removed;
- (6) it was irresponsible to park motorcycles illegally on pedestrian footpaths. From June to July 2021, the Police issued a total of 14 FPTs at Hoi Hing Road Roundabout outside Kong Nam Industrial

Building, which was one of the black spots in the district. The situation at the said location had improved significantly upon the enhancement of law enforcement efforts. Nevertheless, the Police would continue to closely monitor the situation;

- (7) regarding the sale of illicit cigarettes in Sheung Chui Court, the Police would refer the cases to the Customs and Excise Department for follow-up;
- (8) regarding the cases of rape and indecent assault, the number of reported cases of rape was not particularly high in Tsuen Wan district, and the detection rate was generally very high upon investigation. The Police also received reported cases of indecent assault from time to time, and identification of the offenders had mostly been successful. The Police understood the grave concern about these types of cases among residents in the district, and would spare no effort in detecting them; and
- (9) considering that “three-nil” buildings could become easy targets for robbers and burglars, the Tsuen Wan District Fight Crime Committee had launched the “Project Amulet” to encourage buildings in the district to install closed-circuit television systems to prevent crimes. In case crime had been committed, the buildings could provide the Police with relevant video footage to help increase the crime detection rate. So far, there had been no recurrence of the aforesaid types of crimes in the buildings participating in the project. Buildings which were interested in joining the said project were welcome to contact the Police Community Relations Office.

XV Item 14: Crime Brief for Ma Wan – June to July 2021  
(TWDC Paper No. 59/21-22)

134. DC(TW) of the HKPF reported on the crime situation of Ma Wan.

XVI Item 15: Information Papers

135. Members noted the contents of the following information papers:

- (1) Items Resolved by Circulation by the Tsuen Wan District Council during the Period from 13 July to 30 August 2021 (TWDC Paper No. 60/21-22); and
- (2) Financial Statement of Tsuen Wan District Council Funds as at 23 August 2021 (TWDC Paper No. 61/21-22).

XVII Item 16: Any Other Business

136. The Chairman said that the 8<sup>th</sup> Hong Kong Games (HKG) Organising Committee (the Organising Committee) had sent a letter to the TWDC. The Organising Committee invited the TWDC to nominate a District Councillor to replace Mr LAI Man-fai, who had vacated his office, to serve as a representative member of the Organising Committee. He asked Members to nominate one Member for the said position.

137. Mr WONG Ka-wa raised the possibility of appointing a member of the Tsuen Wan District Delegation (the Delegation) of the HKG as a representative member of

the Organising Committee, and enquired if the vacant membership thus created should be filled in such a case. Also, he enquired whether such an appointment would give rise to the issue of overlapping of positions. Certain positions of the Delegation had generally been taken up by representatives from district organisations. Hence, he would like to know whether the election of a representative to the Organising Committee would affect the existing memberships of the Delegation.

138. DLM(TW) of the LCSD said that the elected District Councillor would attend meetings of the Organising Committee on behalf of the TWDC to learn about the latest updates of the 8<sup>th</sup> HKG and discuss matters on the HKG. The elected District Councillor could concurrently serve as members of the Delegation and Organising Committee without any role conflict.

139. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu suggested electing a representative member of the Organising Committee at this meeting first. He also pointed out that the Delegation already comprised representatives from district organisations. Any necessary reassignment of positions among members of the Delegation could be further discussed after the meeting.

140. The Chairman stated that a District Councillor's current position in the Delegation would remain unchanged even if he or she was appointed as a representative member of the Organising Committee. All District Councillors were eligible to take up the said position representing the TWDC, and attend meetings of the Organising Committee.

141. Mr LI Hung-por nominated Mr LAU Cheuk-yu to serve as the representative member of the Organising Committee.

142. Mr KOT Siu-yuen nominated himself to serve as the representative member of the Organising Committee.

143. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the nominations. The voting result was that Mr LAU Cheuk-yu received 5 votes in favour and Mr KOT Siu-yuen received 4 votes in favour.

144. The Chairman announced that Mr LAU Cheuk-yu would serve as a member of the Organising Committee representing the TWDC.

145. The Chairman said that the LCSD had previously sent consultative questionnaires to Members in order to collect their views as to which venues in Tsuen Wan district should be selected to undergo modification works for public play spaces in 2022/23. Upon the expiry of the consultation period, the LCSD received a total of seven questionnaires. The higher-ranking venues were Tsuen Wan Park (Phase II), Tsuen Wan Tin Hau Temple Garden and Tsuen King Circuit Children's Playground, Tsuen Wan. Hence, the LCSD recommended selecting the aforesaid venues to undergo modification works in 2022/23. He asked Members to take note of that.

146. The Chairman stated that the Working Group on Tsuen Wan District Football Representative Team (Non-standing) (WGTWDFRT) had previously received an

application from the Hoi King Sports Association (HKSA). The HKSA wished to serve as the district football team representing Tsuen Wan to participate in matches of the Hong Kong Football Association (HKFA) in the next football season. The Chairman asked whether Members agreed that the TWDC should recommend the HKSA's application to the HKFA.

147. The Chairman asked if Members had to make declarations of interest. No Member made a declaration of interest.

148. Mr WONG Ka-wa enquired of the Secretariat whether it had sent letters on the matter concerned to all football teams under the HKFA, and about the number of applications it had received.

149. The Secretary responded that the Secretariat had sent invitation letters to all football teams under the HKFA. A total of two applications had been received, but one of them did not meet the eligibility criteria.

150. Mr WONG Ka-wa enquired whether the Secretariat had requested the ineligible football team to submit supplementary documents and address its problems upon identifying the ineligibility of its application; if yes, he enquired why the football team still failed to meet the eligibility criteria.

151. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio said he learnt at a past meeting of the WGTWDFRT that the football team concerned was ineligible because its application form indicated that it was not under the HKFA.

152. EOI(DC) of the TWDO stated that the football team concerned was ineligible because it was not under the HKFA. It only submitted an application after learning of the TWDC's recruitment of a district football team. Among the applications received by the Secretariat, only the HKSA's application met the eligibility criteria.

153. Mr LAM Sek-tim enquired of the Chairman whether the "matches of the HKFA in the next football season" which the district football team representing Tsuen Wan would participate in referred to the 2021/22 matches or 2022/23 matches.

154. The Chairman learnt from the LCSD that it had undertaken to provide a practice venue for the Tsuen Wan Football Association (TWFA) in preparation for dozens of upcoming matches. Also, the LCSD would only provide practice venues for football teams recommended by the HKFA. Subject to the HKFA's approval, the HKSA would serve as the Tsuen Wan district football team next year at the earliest.

155. DLM(TW) of the LCSD said the LCSD was recently notified by the Home Affairs Bureau (HAB) that the designation of the TWFA as the Tsuen Wan district football representative team was confirmed. Hence, the LCSD would provide the TWFA with 36 football training sessions free of charge. It also learnt that the HAB would subsidise the TWFA's football training in 2021/22.

156. The Chairman stated that if Members endorsed the proposal of designating the HKSA as the district football team, the TWDC would subsequently send letters to

the HAB, LCSD and TWDO for their follow-up. He suggested that the LCSD should make a decision only after receiving comments from the HKFA.

157. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said that at a past meeting of the WGTWDFRT, a Member moved a motion to not recommend designating the TWFA as the district football team. Yet, the TWFA had now been designated as the district football team in 2021/22 and was granted subsidies. As such, he requested clarification as to whether the HKFA had the right of final decision and whether the TWDC could take a vote on designating the HKSA as the district football team.

158. Mr KOT Siu-yuen said the HKFA's decision to designate the TWFA as the team representing Tsuen Wan in the 2021/22 matches already implied that the TWDC did not have the right of decision. He thus enquired about the point of discussing the matter at this moment.

159. Mr WONG Ka-wa declared his membership of the TWFA, and enquired of the Chairman whether he could speak on the matter. The Chairman agreed that Mr WONG Ka-wa could speak on the matter.

160. Mr WONG Ka-wa said that while the WGTWDFRT had moved a motion, the HKFA had the power to decide on district football representative teams. The HAB would provide the football representative teams with resources for training and matches. In a previous discussion with relevant Members, he opined that the TWDC should have decided on the district football team as early as in the beginning of this year, rather than discussing the matter over and over again and missing the golden opportunity for conveying to the HKFA its views on the district football representative team for the year. In his opinion, the only thing the TWDC could do now was to convey to the HKFA its views on next year's district football representative team. He hoped that the HKFA would listen to the TWDC's views then.

161. Mr CHAN Sung-ip declared his vice-chairmanship of the TWFA. The Chairman agreed that Mr CHAN Sung-ip could speak on the matter.

162. Mr CHAN Sung-ip said that the HKFA invited the 18 districts to establish district football teams to participate in the newly-formed Third Division League years ago. Some district football teams might be playing in higher tier matches, i.e. those of the Second Division League. All district football teams were recognised by the HKFA, and could apply for a resource grant from their respective District Councils (DCs).

163. Mr YAU Kam-ping declared his vice-chairmanship of the TWFA. The Chairman agreed that Mr YAU Kam-ping could speak on the matter.

164. Mr YAU Kam-ping was aware that although the TWFA no longer applied for funding from the TWDC, it was still recognised by the HKFA and would independently secure resources for participating in matches. Besides, the HKFA was accorded priority to use all venues under the LCSD. As the HKFA had assisted the TWFA in hiring a venue of the LCSD, the venue had been reserved for the use of the TWFA. If the TWDC designated an additional district football team now, it would

bring uncertainty to the HKFA's scheduling of matches. He thus advised the TWDC to refrain from entering another district football representative team for this year's matches for resource-saving purposes, and to allocate its resources to other uses.

165. Mr LAM Sek-tim said he was aware that the application period for the HKFA's matches had expired. He enquired whether the TWFA had received any funding from the HAB even though it was not subsidised by the TWDC for the time being. Also, he enquired whether the HKSA would participate in matches representing Tsuen Wan district in the 2021/22 or the 2022/23 football season if its application was endorsed by the TWDC. Besides, he wished to know whether the matches in this year's football season would remain unaffected despite the TWDC's discussion.

166. Considering the funding the TWFA would receive from Tsuen Wan district, Mr LAU Cheuk-yu enquired whether the Members who had declared their vice-chairmanship and membership of the TWFA could cast their votes later, and whether there was a conflict of interest. Moreover, he noted that five years ago the HKFA's provisions stipulated that district football representative teams should be supported by their respective DCs. However, the relevant provisions had been amended and the DCs could now only play an advisory role.

167. Mr KOT Siu-yuen said that the HKFA still had the right of final decision even though the TWDC had formed the WGTWDFRT and voiced their views on football affairs in the district. This was the reason why he did not join the WGTWDFRT back then. While he did not object to endorsing the designation of the HKSA as the recommended district football team, he opined that the HKFA should inform the HKSA of its decision as soon as possible.

168. Mr WONG Ka-wa said that since the TWDC did not have the right of final decision and in his view the "Any Other Business" of the agenda was only for reporting on various matters rather than holding a ballot, it was the HKFA, not the TWDC, which should handle the matters of liaising with the football team concerned and authorising it to be the district football team.

169. The Vice Chairman said that he was not a football enthusiast and would not favour any football team. He only wanted to give a supplementary account of how the events unfolded. At the beginning, he hoped that the TWFA would continue to collaborate with the TWDC. However, perhaps due to some misunderstanding, the TWFA took the initiative to withdraw from its status as the team representing the TWDC in football matches, and ceased to apply for funds from the TWDC. The TWDC thus established the WGTWDFRT to follow up on this matter. Members of the WGTWDFRT started a tendering exercise without any knowledge of the HKFA's possession of the right of final decision. During the tendering exercise, the TWDC had also sent a letter to the TWFA but received no reply from it. In the end, the TWDC received two application forms. As one of the football teams was not a member of the HKFA, only the HKSA's application was eligible. He had met with representatives from the HKSA, and considered the HKSA very sincere in its intention to promote football development in Tsuen Wan district. Lastly, he held that an explanation should be given to the HKSA and the TWDC's desire should be voiced, even though the HKFA had the right of final decision.

170. The Chairman said that if the HKSA's application was endorsed, it would represent Tsuen Wan district in the matches of the next (i.e. 2022/23) football season as the HKFA had already undertaken that the TWFA would represent the district in this year's matches. He also pointed out that the outcome of the WGTWDFRT's discussion on recommending a new district football team should have been examined by the RSACFAC. However, as the office of Chairman of the RSACFAC was vacant, the said matter had to be handed over to the TWDC instead. Even though the matter had been discussed at this meeting, the HKFA could still choose to authorise the TWFA to be the district football team for the matches of the next football season of the HKFA. He did not recommend a detailed discussion among Members under Any Other Business of the agenda. A same-day decision should be made at this meeting to avoid further delays; otherwise, it would be unfair to the HKSA. In his opinion, the TWDC should duly perform its duties regardless of the final decisions of the HKFA and HAB. He enquired whether Members agreed to the HKSA's application to serve as the district football representative team.

171. The Chairman asked if Members had to make declarations of interest. Mr CHAN Sung-ip and Mr YAU Kam-ping declared their vice-chairmanship of the TWFA. Mr WONG Ka-wa declared his membership of the TWFA.

172. The Chairman stated that the issue concerned was closely related to the TWFA. Hence, he decided that the Members who had declared their executive positions of Vice Chairmen and Member of the TWFA could not participate in the voting.

173. The Chairman asked Members to vote on the proposal that the TWDC should recommend to the HKFA the HKSA's application to serve as the district football team representing Tsuen Wan to participate in the HKFA's matches in the next football season. After voting, the proposal was endorsed with 4 votes in favour, 0 vote against and 2 votes abstention.

174. The Chairman asked the Secretariat to convey Members' views to the HKFA in writing and send copies of the letter to the HAB, LCSD and TWDO.

(Post-meeting note: The Secretariat conveyed Members' views to the HKFA in writing on 9 September 2021.)

175. The Chairman said that in order to follow up matters relating to the Report on Innovative Solutions to Urban Greening in Tsuen Wan, he proposed setting up a non-standing working group named "Working Group on Follow-up Action on the Report on Innovative Solutions to Urban Greening in Tsuen Wan". The working group would be tasked with following up with related government departments on matters in relation to the Report on Innovative Solutions to Urban Greening in Tsuen Wan.

176. The Chairman asked Members if they agreed that the non-standing working group should be set up, that it should be named "Working Group on Follow-up Action on the Report on Innovative Solutions to Urban Greening in Tsuen Wan", and that its

terms of reference should be “to follow up matters relating to the Report on Innovative Solutions to Urban Greening in Tsuen Wan”. Members unanimously agreed to the proposals.

177. The Chairman asked Members to express their intention to join the above Working Group by a show of hands. The membership list of the above Working Group was at Annex.

(Post-meeting note: The Secretariat invited Members who did not join the above Working Group at this meeting to join the above Working Group in writing on 29 September 2021.)

178. The Vice Chairman proposed that the Chairman should take up the role of Convenor of the above Working Group. Members unanimously agreed to the proposal.

179. The Chairman said that he would make an arrangement with the Secretariat regarding the date and time of the meeting of the Working Group. The LCSD, Civil Engineering and Development Department (CEDD), HyD, TD, Housing Department and TWDO would be invited to send their representatives to attend the meeting of the Working Group to follow up relevant matters.

180. The Chairman said that to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the founding of the satellite town of Tsuen Wan, the TWDC would produce a commemorative publication. However, the production of such a commemorative publication would not require an application for DC funds. He proposed authorising him and the Vice Chairman to handle the related matters. Members unanimously agreed to the arrangement.

181. The Chairman said that the WGAFSTTW also planned to organise an activity at Tsuen Wan Town Hall jointly with a non-governmental organisation. Ethnic minorities and people with disabilities would be invited to participate in the activity. Any Members who wished to put forth any plans or proposals on matters relating to the 60th anniversary of the founding of the satellite town of Tsuen Wan were reminded to raise any such plans or proposals with him as soon as possible.

182. Mr LAU Cheuk-yu said that he had contacted the LandsD again after the site inspection at Hong Kong Gun Club (HKGC) conducted earlier. He hoped that the LandsD would arrange another site inspection at HKGC for Members. He also hoped that the LandsD would make supplementary remarks on the letter sent to the HKGC earlier.

183. AA/Lands(DLO) of the LandsD said that Members could suggest a date for site inspection to the LandsD so that the LandsD could contact other relevant departments for site inspection arrangements.

184. The Chairman said that after the Member concerned had discussed and confirmed the date of site inspection with the LandsD, Members who were interested in or available for the site inspection could sign up for it. In addition, he hoped that

the LandsD would make supplementary remarks on the content of the letter in question after the meeting.

185. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio suggested that the HKPF and TD should send their representatives to join Members for a site inspection in the vicinity of Yeung Uk Road and Wo Tik Street to review the traffic control measures recently implemented at the said locations.

186. The Chairman asked the HKPF and other departments to arrange a site inspection in the vicinity of Yeung Uk Road and Wo Tik Street for Members.

187. Mr WONG Ka-wa suggested increasing the number of lockers at the pitches/courts under the LCSD and basketball court in Princess Alexandra Community Centre under the TWDO to facilitate the storage of personal belongings by venue users and prevent theft. As far as he knew, the TWDO had completed the consultation exercise on the provision of additional parking spaces for motorcycles at Lei Shu Road. He thus suggested that the TD should expedite the procedures for the above works. Incidentally, he suggested placing red traffic cones at the double white lines on Yeung Uk Road and Wo Tik Street for separation purposes to prevent illegal parking. In addition, shops at Tsuen Wan Plaza and Hau Tei Square would occupy the metered parking spaces at the shop front to facilitate their vehicles' entry into and exit from the shops, and the situation had not improved so far. In his opinion, such a situation had made it difficult for the residents to park their vehicles there and would hinder the normal operation of shops. He thus suggested cancelling all the metered parking spaces thereat. Besides, he pointed out that electric bicycles were often seen travelling on vehicular roads in a direction opposite to the traffic. To prevent accidents, he suggested that the Police and related departments should step up their publicity and enforcement efforts.

188. Mr LAM Sek-tim said that he identified quite a number of problems when he visited the cycle track at Tsuen Wan waterfront earlier. Considering that Members had never conducted a site inspection at the cycle track upon its commissioning, he suggested that a site inspection should be conducted on 19 September 2021, the Cycle Day, to examine the actual situation of the cycle track upon its commissioning so as to prevent accidents.

189. Mr LUK Ling-chung, Antonio suggested that the CEDD should submit a paper for the next DPDFMC meeting for a discussion over the operation of the cycle track in question. He also suggested that the staff of the CEDD should arrange for a joint site inspection with Members.

190. Chief Engineer/West 2 of the CEDD thanked the Members who had participated in the cycling safety promotional activity held on 5 September 2021. She said that members of the public who participated in the activity would, upon registration, listen to a 15-minute briefing on cycling safety tips, which covered the appropriate clothing and safety gear for cycling, methods for checking the bicycles, safety rules to follow when cycling, etc. After that, participants could rent a cycle for an hour. To make the activity even more interesting, participants could take photos at designated spots and join a quiz relating to cycling safety, and pick up

souvenirs and enjoy frozen desserts at the Tsuen Wan Waterfront Cycling Entry/Exit Hub after completing various missions. The next cycling experience activity would be held on 19 September 2021. Members of the public could browse the site of NT Cycle Track Network <<https://www.ntctn.hk/asset/TsuenWanActivitiesWorkshopsTimetable-tc.pdf>> to find out more about the activities timetable and information on the latest activities. The CEDD would also inform Members of the details of the activities after the meeting and arrange a site inspection for Members.

191. The Chairman said that Members could conduct a site inspection at the cycle track on their own at suitable times, and discuss the operation of the cycle track and proposals for improvement in the DPDFMC meetings.

192. The Chairman reminded Members that the date of the next meeting was 23 November 2021 and the deadline for submission of papers was 8 November 2021.
